**Prepare Jackson
 County Exhibit
 For State Fair**

The county exhibit for the state
 fair is being prepared. Plans are
 under way to have a wonderful ex-
 hibit from Jackson county at the
 state fair at Salem this fall. Al-
 ready collections have been made on
 various grains and grasses and al-
 falfa and now is the time to make
 selections of good pears and other
 fruit. We expect to show a full line
 of agricultural products that are
 grown in Jackson county and will
 appreciate the co-operation of every
 farmer and fruit grower who has
 something nice for this exhibit.

Any person having material which
 they think would make a nice dis-
 play should communicate with the
 county agent, so that arrangements
 can be made to select the material
 and place in proper storage.

Jackson county made a fine show-
 ing last year on fruits and vege-
 tables and we want to make a dis-
 play this year which will cover all
 the agricultural products grown in
 the county.

**First Company
 Send Men To
 Camp Perry**

A telegram was received by Cap-
 tain Wm. M. Briggs of the 1st com-
 pany, C. A. O. N. G. this afternoon
 notifying him that A. J. McAllen

and J. Q. Adams, both of the First
 company, C. A. O. N. G., have been
 designated by the adjutant general
 of the state of Oregon as team mem-
 bers to represent the state of Ore-
 gon at the national rifle matches, to
 be held at Camp Perry, Ohio.

McAllen and Adams, both of
 whom are well known Ashland boys,
 leave Portland August 22 and will
 remain in Ohio about a month. Mc-
 Allen and Adams are considered to
 be two of the best shots in the state
 of Oregon and have many times
 carried off high honors in that con-
 nection heretofore.

The men selected to go to Camp
 Perry makes the members of the
 First company feel a sense of just
 pride in their organization. Very
 few organizations in the state were
 permitted to send two members, as
 only 12 are on the entire team from
 Oregon.

**FORESTER WILL
 IMPROVE ASSETS
 AS TOURIST LURE**

C. J. Buck, district forester, with
 headquarters in Portland, who ar-
 rived yesterday left the same day
 for a tour of the Crater Lake Na-
 tional park. He will visit Dead In-
 dian Springs, Recreation creek,
 Union creek, Diamond lake and
 Lake o' Woods, the object of the
 visit being to inspect the recrea-
 tional possibilities of these spots as
 a summer playground. Steps will
 be taken to survey the land for
 summer cottage sites, and to develop
 the hunting and fishing, as a lure
 for tourists. At Diamond lake and
 Lake o' Woods the bathing facilities
 will come in for consideration, there
 being fine beaches at both.

Application for a concession for
 a hotel and store at Union creek has
 been made, but not acted upon as
 yet by the department of the in-
 terior. There is a store at Dead In-
 dian Springs. It is expected that
 these privileges will be sought for
 Recreation creek, Diamond lake and
 Lake o' Woods before next season.
 Secretary of the Interior Fall, on his
 visit to this section next week, will
 be apprised of the fitness of the
 above spots for camping.

The above prospective resorts are
 tributary to Crater Lake, and one
 of the dreams of Crater Lake boost-
 ers for years has been to establish
 them as feeders to the scenic resort.
 The finest hunting and fishing in
 the world abounds in the streams
 and on the hills of this section. It
 is also highly productive of wild
 blackberries and raspberries, dew-
 berries and huckleberries. Many lo-
 cal residents trek annually to that
 district for the wild fruit it affords.

**MINING COMPANY
 DEVELOPS CLAIMS
 BLACKWELL HILL**

The National Manganese company
 of Indianapolis is developing placer
 claims in the Blackwell hills on
 Kane's creek, and have expended
 \$60,000 to date in the installation
 of machinery and power accessories.
 They will begin operations in a
 month or six weeks. The California-
 Oregon Power company has just
 completed the installation of power
 lines to the property that will be
 used in the operation of a dredge
 that is now being set up. It is ex-
 pected that the company will invest
 in the neighborhood of \$100,000 be-
 fore a wheel is turned.

The company will also build a
 pipe line to the claims, pumping the
 water from Rogue river, running a
 six-inch pipe line four miles and
 pumping the water up 200 feet for
 use in the dredge.
 The claims were formerly owned
 by the Indiana-Oregon company, and
 the Electric Gold company. They
 were worked back in 1893 and
 1894 and after the expenditure of
 a considerable sum of money, work
 was halted. The last named com-
 pany erected a power plant at Ray
 Gold to furnish electricity for the
 operation of the mine. The claims
 were afterwards taken over by the
 National Manganese company, which
 is now developing them for gold.

The claims are located in the
 same district as the Gold Ridge,
 Roaring Gilet and Millionaire
 mines, now being worked. This sec-
 tion also gave to southern Oregon

some of its richest pockets, and for
 years was the favorite stamping
 grounds of pocket-hunters.

The stamp mill at the Gold Ridge
 mine is now in operation, a power
 line to furnish electricity being con-
 structed. The same motive power
 is being used at the Millionaire mine.

The announcement was made last
 week of the renewal of work at the
 Opp mine near Jacksonville. H. L.
 Walther of the California-Oregon
 Power company said yesterday that
 the power lines would be extended
 beyond the Opp mine due west for
 the development of new property in
 that section and said to be on the
 same ledge as the Millionaire and
 Gold Ridge mines.

Actual development work and ex-
 penditures of finances indicate a re-
 vival of mining in southern Oregon
 by eastern and northwest capital.
