stay there a couple of months and then go to Italy for several months, so you see I'll need all the rent you can get as I might get stranded over here and never get home.

"Norway is very picturesque. Mountains everywhere and well kept little farms, separated by low stone-walls. Most of the houses are white and newly painted. I asked if they painted every spring and was told that the reason so many of the houses are freshly painted is that during the war they couldn't get oil so the past two years practically every house has been painted. The women are immaculate housekeepers, so everything is spotlessly clean. Whenever we go calling, even if we stay just a few minutes, they serve wine and delicious little cakes that just melt in our mouths. Then, if we stay longer, we get coffee, buttered bread with cheese or something spread on it and just single slices, not sandwiches like at home.

"While in Kongsberg we went to several picnics, and Helga, the girl I came to Norway with, asked me to make some sandwiches and I made American ones. The rest of the picnic party called them "surprise packages," because they couldn't see what was between the slices of bread."

##### WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE DECIDES TO REPEAL EXPRESS TAX ON 20 PER CENT VALUES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 16.—The repeal of the express tax on every 20 per cent value has been decided upon by the ways and means committee. The committee also voted to levy a flat tax of \$10 on retailers of soft drinks and a fixed manufacturer's tax on cereal beverages at 12 cents per gallon, instead of the 15 per cent on sale prices.

Late Friday the committee voted to increase the income tax exemption for married men from \$2,000 on incomes below \$5,000, retroactive to January 1, this year.

##### WINBURN WANTS REDRESS; ALLEGE INJUSTICE DONE

refused to take action on the communication of Mr. Winburn, read at that time, stating that it was a personal controversy between Mr. Winburn and Attorney Briggs.

Mayor Lamkin and members of the council explained to Mr. Winburn last night that Mr. Briggs was not a member of the city council but was merely a legal advisor and that consequently the council was not responsible for any statement that he might make. When the second communication was presented last night the council at first refused to have it read, stating that a decision had been made at last week's council meeting that would not admit of going into the matter. Mr. Winburn then addressed the council, explaining his action and stating that he had been insulted at a meeting of the council which he had been asked to attend and had done so against his own wishes. His talk caused a discussion among the council members with the result that the communication was read. Following a reading of the communication

it was agreed that both Mr. Winburn and Attorney Briggs should have an opportunity to present their sides of the case at a meeting of the council next Tuesday evening. Through-

out the various discussions that have resulted over his alleged charge against Mr. Winburn, Attorney Briggs has refused to withdraw his statement.
