of his brow. He is a poor man. He tells me that he had this mash for experimental purposes. I think the ends of justice would be served by imposing a light fine and a suspended jail sentence and permit this man, who has learned his lesson, to go back to his wife and children, who are dependent upon him.

Special Agent Sandifer took exception to the inferences by Attorney Roberts that Coffman had been promised mercy and said that he made no recommendations to the court as to what sentences should be imposed in the case. The defense lawyer claimed that his client had been promised mercy. A rather warm interchange of words ensued, in which Attorney Roberts alluded to Sandifer as "this respectable gentleman."

District Attorney Rawles Moore in contesting the leniency plea for Coffman, informed the court that the defendant had been the subject of a grand jury investigation before the arrival of the special agents, that Coffman made but little pretense to work his farm and that he should have considered his wife and children before he started violating the law.

Special Agent Sanifer stated that "there would be bootleggers as long as there were moonshiners," and told of finding the mash at Coffman's place.

John Goodwin, taxicab driver, was then arraigned and announced that he was ready for trial. The state asked for a continuance until next Monday morning at 10 o'clock on the grounds that the star witness, designated as "John Doe," was out of the city. The continuance was granted.
