statements Attorney Briggs sought to show by the combined statements of three witnesses, Sylvan Provost, Dominio Provost and Clark Buyers, that he, Briggs, had not attempted to influence Winburn in letting of the sewage work. Their statements were arrayed against those of Winburn and Whitehead. In conclusion, Attorney Briggs still maintained that Winburn had lied on the occasion of the council meeting of July 12.

Newbury Gets a Laugh

Following Attorney Briggs' presentation of his case, Attorney Newbury cross examined the defendant, and sought to show that Briggs had put words in the mouths of his witnesses. Attorney Newbury made an impassioned plea—whether to the council or the audience is not quite clear—and referred feelingly to the "silvered locks" of Mr. Winburn as denoting an aged man had been insulted by a young man, to wit one William Briggs, city attorney of Ashland. Thereupon the audience gave close scrutiny to Mr. Winburn's notably bald head and brow and questioned by much chuckling and laughing the sincerity of Newbury's remark.

Mr. Winburn made a plea on, his own behalf stating words to the effect that he had been "grafted" in various real estate and other transactions here. He stated that he had made many plans for Ashland's betterment and that he would still place the city on "the map." He denied speaking disparagingly of the city council.
