EXPORT DECLINE REACTS ON U. S. HOME MARKETS

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ing from government funds.

It is expected that several hundred million dollars will be advanced by the corporation, now that it becomes evident that heavier withdrawals on the export credit account will be justified.

Most of the corporation's loans have been made to assist in financing exports, which are permitted to remain in American warehouses for a period of six months before actual movement overseas.

Government Looks for Some Improvement by Another Year.

Under this plan the government is giving support to the producer and exporter, expecting that by the beginning of another year conditions will have improved, both in domestic and international trade, as a result of adjustment of some of the disorders now noted in foreign currency systems.

The program to finance the needs of farmers on products raised this year will call for heavy advances in these channels. Officials today could not estimate what sums may be needed to facilitate the operations of the farmers. But there is a firm disposition by the administration, through the medium of the finance corporation and the federal reserve system, to make credit more easily available to agricultural groups and to help them to keep on their feet until business becomes normal. Several hundred million dollars in advances is probable.

Where normal credit channels are broken down abroad, but there exists an excellent prospect that before long credit arrangements will be revived, the war finance corporation is stepping in promptly to relieve financial distress.

Some \$30,000,000 Advanced to Finance Cotton Exports.

Both in those export advances already made and the application for loans now forming the basis of negotiation, cotton is the chief commodity.

More than \$30,000,000 is involved by cotton loans to finance exports. Large advances are to be made soon on wheat for export. These initial advances will be about \$10,000,000. Large advances also have been made to support exports of condensed milk and meat products. In these two groups the advances have amounted to about \$5,000,000. Other substantial advances have been scattered over a wide range of such commodities as tobacco, copper, sheet steel, sugar, mill machinery, canned fruits and vegetables. Out of the advances of the corporation, \$22,000,000 has been loaned to banking institutions for the benefit of their export connections.

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powder require greased pans, and are baked in a hotter oven than the true sponge cake.

Five egg yolks, 1 cup sugar, 1 cup flour, 5 egg whites, 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon lemon extract, 1 teaspoon vanilla extract.

Beat the yolks of eggs until thick; add sugar gradually, beating with the egg-beater; add flavoring. Beat whites of eggs as for angel cake until stiff and firm, using a whip egg-beater; fold carefully into the yolk mixture, then gradually fold in the flour. Pour into an ungreased tube cake pan and bake in a slow oven about 50 minutes.

This formula will make two dozen small cakes.

Plain Baking Powder Sponge Cake

Three eggs, 1 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons water, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1 teaspoon lemon.

Beat the eggs without separating, till light and creamy; add sugar and beat again till thick and very light colored. Add water, beat again, add sifted dry ingredients. Beat well, then add flavoring. Pour into a greased cake pan, one with a center tube preferred, and bake about 30 minutes in a moderate oven, or bake in layers.

Jelly Roll Three eggs, 1 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons water, 1 cup flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon lemon and vanilla, 1 tablespoon melted shortening.

Separate eggs and beat yolks until thick and lemon colored; add sugar and beat again, then add water and sifted dry ingredients and beat well. Add flavoring and melted shortening. Lastly, fold in the stiffly beaten egg whites.

Have a shallow pan well greased and lined with greased paper. Pour in cake mixture and bake in a hot oven between 10 and 12 minutes. Turn at once on to a cloth which has been sprinkled with powdered sugar, remove paper, cut off the crusts, spread with jelly and roll.

(This must be done quickly.) Wrap in cloth until cool and sprinkle with powdered sugar. Layer Cake One-half cup shortening, 1 1-3 cups sugar, 2 cups flour sifted with 2 teaspoons baking powder, 3 eggs, 1/2 cup milk or water, 1 teaspoon each of vanilla and lemon extract. Cream shortening until it may be beaten with a spoon, add sugar gradually and continue to cream. Add eggs one at a time and beat the mixture thoroughly each time. Then add flour and liquid alternately; add flavoring. Bake in three well greased layer cake pans in a moderate oven about 20 minutes.
