Application forms have been received by Ashland Post No. 14 of the American Legion for all ex-service persons in this community who will make claim for either the bonus or loan.

The application forms are known as initial application blanks, and must be filed with the commission at Salem before May 31, 1922. The applicant will determine by this form whether he will take the cash or loan. If he elects to take the cash, the commission will prepare a claim and send it to the applicant for completion and signature. The claim will then be returned to the commission, who in turn will present the completed claim to the secretary of state for payment. If he elects to take a loan he shall so designate. He may decide to take a loan immediately or at any future date, time limit not specified.

If he has received state educational aid or a bonus from any other source, the amount so received shall be deducted. This includes the \$60 government bonus.

The ORIGINAL discharge must accompany the initial application, which upon verification by the commission will be returned to the applicant by registered mail.

A committee from the local post of the American Legion will be appointed to assist all applicants in the completion of their applications and will endeavor to supply them with all the necessary information concerning them. Just at present all applications and instructions will be handled by the adjutant and Millard W. Grubb, assistant postmaster, who has made a thorough study of the provisions of the law.

The I. W. W.'s attempted to cause a general strike in the harvest fields around Aberdeen, S. D., but the American Legion posts established tree employment bureaus for the farmers and the harvest was completed without serious difficulties in the three weeks that the bureau was active they gave 1017 free meals, found jobs for 617 men gave beds to 394 men, and 373 free baths, and treatment by post physician for twelve cases.

Our insurance department has just received news that the time limit for reinstatement for your federal insurance has been extended to January 1, 1922. If your insurance has lapsed, it can be reinstated by the payment of two months premium for the amount for which you wish to reinstate. Your insurance can then be immediately converted into one of several different kinds of insurance. Dividends are being paid by the government on converted insurance; the second year's dividends will be distributed next month. The adjutant has the necessary forms and instruction for reinstatement. Get them—it will pay you.

**Distribution of State Bonus To Veterans of World War**

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The Tidings is in receipt of complete data relative to the Oregon bonus act from the World War Veterans State Aid commission. Owing to the lengthy nature of the articles they must by necessity be run in installments which will be found every day in the Tidings until a complete explanation is made.

**Blank Forms**

4. Blank forms necessary for the administration of the act shall be prepared in the office of the commission, and distributed by the secretary to such individuals as are entitled thereto, and through such agencies as may be authorized by the commission. Such forms, together with the instructions printed thereon, shall have the same force and effect as these regulations.

5. All claims for benefits under the act shall be made on the proper blank forms furnished by the commission, and shall be supported by such evidence as may be required by the commission.

6. The following basic forms shall be furnished each person who claims to be eligible for the benefits of the act:  
 Form SAC-1. Application for cash bonus or loan (for veterans only).  
 Form SAC-6. Relatives application for bonus (for relatives of deceased veterans only).

These forms, hereinafter referred to as the "Initial Application Blank" are for the purpose of establishing the eligibility of the applicant, proof of service and residence, and the furnishing of other data for the information of the commission.

7. The appropriate form from the following shall be furnished to each person who has established eligibility and who has indicated his desire for a loan under the provisions of the act:  
 Form SAC-2. Application for loan on city or town property.  
 Form SAC-3. Application for loan on farm property.

**Verification**

8. Initial applications shall be carefully checked under the supervision of the secretary with all available records, to verify the truth and accuracy of the statements made therein, and to determine the applicant's eligibility, length and quality

or registered for the draft in another state, but application claims actual residence in Oregon at the time of such registration or entry into the service, in addition to the affidavits incorporated in the application, applicant must furnish such other proofs of residence as may be required by the commission.

**Deductions**

12. Where answers to questions in the initial application indicate that the applicant has received educational aid from the state of Oregon, the amount so received will be verified from the records in the office of the secretary of state, and deducted from the amount of cash bonus or loan the applicant is entitled to receive, provided, that if any such money has been refunded by the applicant to the state or Oregon, the amount so refunded will be credited to the applicant before the deduction is made.

13. If the applicant desires the cash bonus and the answers to the questions in the initial application indicate that applicant has applied for or received a bonus or gratuity from another state or country or extra compensation from any source for service in the war between the United States and the German empire and its allies, the amount so received will be verified by the secretary and shall be deducted from the amount of the cash bonus due the applicant.

14. Where answers to the questions in the initial application indicate that a portion of the service of the applicant was in the student army training corps as a student, the period of such service shall be deducted from the total period of service in computing the amount of cash bonus applicant is entitled to receive.
