MEDFORD MAN CHARGED WITH EMBEZZLEMENT IN BOUND OVER TO GRAND JURY

R. E. Johnson, a traveling salesman, charged with embezzlement was bound over to the grand jury by Justice of the Peace Glenh O. Taylor of Medford yesterday morning, with bonds fixed at \$1000. The specific charge against Johnson was the alleged conversion of a \$50 check given to him by Arthur Troutfether, of Ashland, in payment of a bill made out to the Harry E. Peltz company of Klamath Falls. The district attorney in asking that the bonds be fixed at \$1000, said it was "likely that the audit of the books now in progress would show between \$2000 and \$3000 up in the air."
