## Highway Commission Reports on Jackson Co. Road Work

**EDITOR'S NOTE**  
 A full report of the road work done in Jackson county under the supervision of the state highway commission and the Jackson county court is now available in the 1921 annual report of the state highway commission. As the detail is interesting but quite voluminous, the Tidings will print it in sections, dealing only with specific units in each issue. It deals not only with the work already completed with cost of each unit, but with the work immediately contemplated and that contracted but not completed.

### Central Point to Jackson-Josephine County Line Survey

This survey of the Pacific highway covers a distance of twenty-one miles and follows the old county road which traverses a fairly level country. The twelve miles between Gold Hill and the county line follows the grade of the Rogue river and for much of this distance the location is along the bank overlooking the river. From Gold Hill it follows the right bank of the stream to Rocky Point, where a deep narrow gorge makes an ideal crossing, and crossing the river on a concrete arch, the location follows the left bank of the river to the county line.

This location consisted mainly in retracing the old location that had been made over a part of the line some years ago and making minor changes in the old county road which had previously been graded very close to the standard for line and grade. The survey was in charge of F. N. Drinkhall, who began the work on March 3, 1919, in order that the contracts for the paving of this section might be let early in the season.

**Ashland to California Line Survey**  
 Preliminary to the construction that was to be done on this section of the Pacific highway early in the spring of 1919, the line was staked out by F. H. Walker. It followed the line of the old road except on the Ashland end, and kept on the grade that had been built over the Siskiyou mountains by the county. Three different routes were considered out of Ashland, and the middle route between the end of the pavement on the Boulevard and the junction

of the Dead Indian road was finally adopted. This required the construction of some new grade, which was included in the contract for the paving. With the exception of the stretch adjoining the city limits very little grading was required on this line until the Siskiyou mountains were reached, where the roadbed was too narrow for proper drainage, and the line as laid out called for considerable excavation in order to obtain sufficient room for ditches.

### Medford-Prospect Survey

On September 15, 1919, Paul B. Rynning having finished the location on the Ashland-Keno section, moved camp to Prospect on the Medford-Crater Lake highway, to locate this road from that point to Medford, a distance of forty-six miles.

In 1916 the government in cooperation with the state and county had run a preliminary line over this route, the notes on which were worked up in the office during the winter following, but no location was staked out in the field. This preliminary line was run on railroad standards, with three per cent grades and 11 degree and 30 minute curves. As the line followed the bluffs along the Rogue river these standards could not be adhered to and 16 degree curves were used in some places. It was the original intention of the government to make a grade upon which railway track could be laid and trains operated, if desired. Construction on these lines involved many deep cuts and very high fills.

The new line is located on the standards established by the state; it follows the contours of the bluffs more closely, reduces the yardage by several hundred thousand cubic yards, and makes that section of the road above Trail more scenic.

South of Trail the government's survey followed the right bank of Rogue river to Dodge's bridge, and crossing over the river at this point it continues down the left bank to the camping ground owned by the Elks of Medford, thence in a southerly direction to Medford. Although this route down the river is the most scenic, it is also the more costly and longer, besides it does not serve the local traffic as well as does the route that has been adopted via Eagle Point.

ident of the state of Oregon, and who has been honorably discharged or separated from such service or has been retired or furloughed to a reserve, shall be entitled to receive a loan or bonus under the provisions of this act; provided, that no person shall be entitled to a loan or bonus hereunder who, being in the military or naval service of the United States subsequent to the sixth day of April, 1917, refused on conscientious, political or other grounds to subject himself to military discipline or to render unqualified service, or whose only service was in the students' army training corps as a student.

**Section 4. Qualifications, Continued.**—Any person who has received from another state a bonus or gratuity equal in amount to that provided by this act, or any person who received for such military or naval service extra compensation equal to or exceeding the bonus provided by this act, shall not be entitled to receive a bonus hereunder; provided, however, that any person, otherwise qualified, who received from another state a bonus or gratuity less in amount to that provided by this act, and any person who received extra compensation from any source, government or private, for such military or naval service less in amount than the bonus hereby provided, shall be entitled to and receive the difference between the amount so received from another state as a bonus or gratuity, or as extra compensation, and the amount such person would be entitled to as a bonus under this act; provided, however, that the allowance of \$60 paid by the federal government at the time of discharge shall not be deemed a bonus or extra compensation within the meaning of this section.

**Section 5. Certain Relatives to Receive Bonus of Deceased Soldiers or Sailors.**—The husband, wife, child, mother or father, or dependent sister or dependent brother, in the order named, and none other, of any deceased person, male or female, who was enlisted, inducted, warranted or commissioned, and who served honorably in active duty in the military or naval service of the United States, shall be paid the bonus that such deceased person would have been entitled to hereunder had such deceased person lived.

**Section 6. Application for Bonus to be Made within One Year.**—All applications for a cash bonus under this act shall be made within one year after this act becomes of force and effect or within one year after the applicant's discharge, provided that the applicant was in the service at the time this act becomes of force and effect.

**Section 7. Bonus and Loan Optional.**—Any person fully qualified to receive either a loan or bonus hereunder shall have the option of electing to take either a cash bonus or to receive a farm or home loan, but no person shall be entitled to both a cash bonus and a farm or home loan.

**Section 8. Persons Who Receive Educational Aid to Make Refund.**—Any person who has received the benefits under the act providing for state financial aid to soldiers, sailors and marines for educational purposes shall make a refund to the state of the amount so received before he shall be entitled to receive a loan or bonus under this act.

## CAN EUROPE PRODUCE GOOD PICTURES? YES WITH AMERICAN DIRECTORS AND STARS

Can Europe make movies that equal those produced in this country?

Except for a bare half dozen of the most ambitious European spectacle-pictures released in this country during the last few months, Europe to date has shown no pictures comparable in anyway with the average pictures made in Hollywood. But, given American directors and American players, say film producers, Europe can easily produce pictures that not only will be as good as those made in this country, but will have the added attraction of Europe's beautiful scenery and the historical settings of the Old World.

With this in mind, the producers of Paramount Pictures have a studio in London. This studio has been in operation for more than a year, and now that the production organization has been whipped into efficient shape Paramount is sending to Europe some of its best directors, who, with all of England and the Continent to draw on for backgrounds, plan to make pictures with prominent American players in the casts.

In the leading roles are Ann Forrest and David Powell, two well known American players. Scenes for this production will be photographed in France, as well as England.

"Beside the Bonnie Brier Bush," Ian MacLaren's famous Scotch story is now being produced in Scotland by Donald Crisp. "Dangerous Lies," an original photoplay by E. Phillips Oppenheim, has just been finished in London by Paul Powell.

More and more motion pictures are becoming international because the American film enthusiast is no longer content with the oft-photographed hills of Hollywood or the locations of Port Lee.

### SOLDIERS' BONUS LAW

General Laws of Oregon, 1921  
 CHAPTER 201  
 Effective on and after May 25, 1921  
 AN ACT

To provide for the industrial rehabilitation of all persons and certain dependents of deceased persons, who served in the world war between the United States and the German empire and its allies, and to provide for loans or cash bonus; prescribing qualifications of those who shall receive such loan or bonus; fixing the amount of such loan or bonus and creating a commission to be known as "world war veterans' state aid commission," and fixing the powers and duties of said commission; authorizing the issuance and prescribing the character and amount of bonds to be issued, and creating a special fund from the proceeds thereof to carry out the purposes of this act; creating a sinking fund for the retirement of said bonds; authorizing a tax levy for said sinking fund; providing for the appointment of appraisers and attorneys; authorizing said commission to adopt administrative rules and regulations and making an appropriation to cover administrative expense.

Recognizing the heroic sacrifices of our soldiers, sailors and marines who offered themselves as a living target in the defense of our land—

Recognizing the difficult problem of readjustment to the economic life of the country they have met upon

return from long months of service that took them from homes, family and positions—

Recognizing then, the handicaps they face by reason of unequal losses and sacrifices imposed upon their patriotism in that grave emergency which threatened our very existence as a people and out of which they brought us victory and peace—

Recognizing equity, justice and a simple duty in effecting some early readjustment of these unequal losses be it enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:

**Section 1. Veterans to Receive Bonus or Loan.**—The state of Oregon, for the purpose of assisting in the industrial rehabilitation of, and providing farm or home aid for, residents of the state who served in the world war, shall pay to each person qualified as hereinafter provided a cash bonus, or shall lend to each person so qualified a sum of money, in the amount and according to the conditions hereinafter contained.

**Section 2. Not to Receive Both State and Federal Bonus.**—In the event that the congress of the United States provides for the payment of a cash bonus to persons qualified to receive a bonus under this act on or before the date on which an amendment to the constitution of the state of Oregon authorizing a bond issue, to provide funds to carry out the provisions of this act becomes effective, then any person qualified to receive a cash bonus from the United States government shall not be qualified to receive a cash bonus hereunder.

**Section 3. Qualifications; Certain Persons Barred.**—Every person, male or female, who was enlisted, inducted, warranted or commissioned in the military or naval service of the United States and who served honorably therein at any time between the sixth day of April, 1917, and the eleventh day of November, 1918, and who served for a period longer than sixty days, and who at the time of entering into such service was a re-
