BIGGER PICTURES COMING NEXT SEASON AS RESULT OF FANS' DEMAND VARIETY

As a result of the motion picture public's demand for more variety in films, Paramount Week, which will be celebrated by most of the theatres of the country during the week of September 4-10, is likely to usher in a season which will be rich in big productions, surpassing any that have been shown heretofore.

The industrial slump, the continued hot weather of this last summer and other conditions combined during the summer to form a buyers' strike on the part of film fans. "The public is bilious from pictures," said one well-known film producer.

Accordingly, the film producers exerted every effort to make their pictures bigger and better than ever, with the desire of offering the most tempting fare to film fans this season.

The list of Paramount pictures scheduled for early release this season, which will be inaugurated by Paramount Week as a national demonstration for better motion pictures, shows that Paramount is leaving no stone unturned to improve the standard of its productions.

"The Affairs of Anatole," directed by Cecil B. DeMille, with a cast including Wallace Reid, Gloria Swanson, Elliott Dexter, Bebe Daniels, Monte Blue, Wanda Hawley, Theodore Roberts, Agnes Ayres, Theodore Kosloff, Polly Moran, Raymond Hutton and Julie Faye, is expected to be the most-talked-of picture of the new season.

"The Great Moment," written by Elinor Glyn especially for Gloria Swanson as Miss Swanson's first Paramount starring picture, is another early fall release. At pre-release showings in New York this picture created a sensation, and smashed all records at the Rivoli theatre during the hottest two weeks of the summer.

Elsie Ferguson in "Footlights" is another picture that is expected to prove a sensational hit. This picture was directed by John S. Robertson, who staged "Sentimental Tommy" and "Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde." Betty Compson's first Paramount starring picture, "At the End of the World" is being heralded as something out of the ordinary in its conception and execution.

This picture is the first produced by Penrhyn Stanlaws, the noted-illustrator, who, as everybody now knows, gave up his brush to become a film director.

William DeMille and Hita Weiman, the short story writer, have been busy for the last several months at the Paramount studio in Hollywood, working on a picture produced by Mr DeMille from Miss Weiman's story, "The Stage Door." The picture will be known as "After the Show," and is said to be the best thing this artist of the films has ever produced. Lila Lee, Jack Holt and Charles Ogle are in the leading parts.

Another picture which is being looked forward to with a great deal of interest is "Ladies Must Live," the last production made by George Loane Tucker before his death. Tucker's "The Miracle Man" is likely to remain for some time to come as the best picture ever produced in this country, and naturally the public is interested in "Ladies Must Live."
