

TIDINGS FASHION HINTS



There is nothing in headwear that outclasses the fine, soft beaver or felt hats made for children. Their beauty and refinement carry them triumphantly to every part of the world, and they are a safe choice from the first to the last hat for girlhood. Three of them are pictured here, and of course their only trimming is a sash or band of ribbon.

Startling values in platinum were uncovered in Curry county last year. Assays of the ore were made in Bandon and at two or three offices in San Francisco. One San Francisco company made returns that there was no platinum values in the ore, but the Bandon assay showed as high as twenty ounces to the ton. One San Francisco concern sent word that the ore indicated from ten to eighteen ounces. It is claimed that these deposits have been traced for nearly twenty miles, from northeast to southwest, ending in the vicinity of the mouth of the Sixes river. The

find created quite a stir at the time, and many claims were staked in the Stutsman section, so named from Guy Stutsman, who discovered the most productive platinum deposits in that region. He had been employed in the workings of the Inman Mines company for several years in sluicing the gold on the Sixes river, and was well versed in the saving of platinum in the company's diggings. His find in a territory twenty to twenty-five miles from the main Curry county highway, near to the head of the Sixes river, caused some excitement. One ranch owner gave him a 90-day option on his mineral rights for \$15,000.

Medford Finds Cited
 Some experienced mining men were slow to believe that the reported finds were realities, declaring that platinum had never been found in ore and claimed that the mineral that caused the excitement in Curry county was some other than platinum, in spite of the fact that all of the placer diggings in that region were very productive of platinum.

The recent find of H. B. Cady and H. E. Rose, of Medford, while engaged in panning a gold trace from a quartz vein in the Gold Hill district confirms the theory that platinum ores do exist in this region. Their find consisted of a twelve penny-weight platinum nugget, worth at \$75 per ounce, \$43.80. The nugget compares favorably with gold nuggets found in the decomposed quartz veins of this region, which after sluffing off of the quartz, from the metal, leaves it raggy and a stringy mass of every conceivable shape. This nugget does not retain any quartz as many of our fine specimen nuggets retain which are found in placer diggings, but, since the search has now begun, the first platinum nugget yet retaining quartz matter, will definitely confirm the reality of platinum ores in our midst.

Southern Oregon Mineral Mecca
 Rare Finds Astonish Experts

Near Gold Hill
 According to Parks and Swartley, of the Oregon bureau of mines, the Highland group of mines are situated twelve miles southwest of Gold Hill, on the right hand fork of Foots creek, at an elevation of 2600 feet. It was first worked about twenty-five years ago. The present workings are confined to the oxide zone; the old workings being more extensive. The vein strikes northeast and dips about thirty-five degrees southeast, and the country rock is a micaceous sandstone.

The owners of the mine in an attempt to discover the source of the platinum found in the shipment, gave the walls of the vein a thorough pan and assay test and found no trace of platinum, and then looked to the vein matter for the source. The vein matter is mingled with three hues of quartz, rose, amber and blue. The blue colored quartz, more dense in its composition than its companion quartzes, is pitted throughout with small cavities, which are lined with a black, sooty mineral, and filled with decomposed iron matter. In crushing and panning this blue quartz invariably gave results with a high per cent of platinum, while with the reports of the local assayers, the results were still better.

Distribution of State Bonus To Veterans of World War

Section 22. May Make Advances on Improvements.—The commission shall provide by rule for making advances to borrowers for improvements on real property to meet payments for material and labor; provided, that such advances shall be so regulated that at the completion of such improvements the total amount loaned shall not exceed 75 per cent of the appraised valuation of the real property after the completion of the improvements.

Section 23. Rule of Construction.—If any section, subdivision, sentence or clause in this act shall be declared invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity or meaning of any other portion of this act.

Section 24. Appropriation.—There is hereby appropriated from any moneys in the general fund not otherwise appropriated, the sum of \$30,000 to cover the administrative expenses of this act.

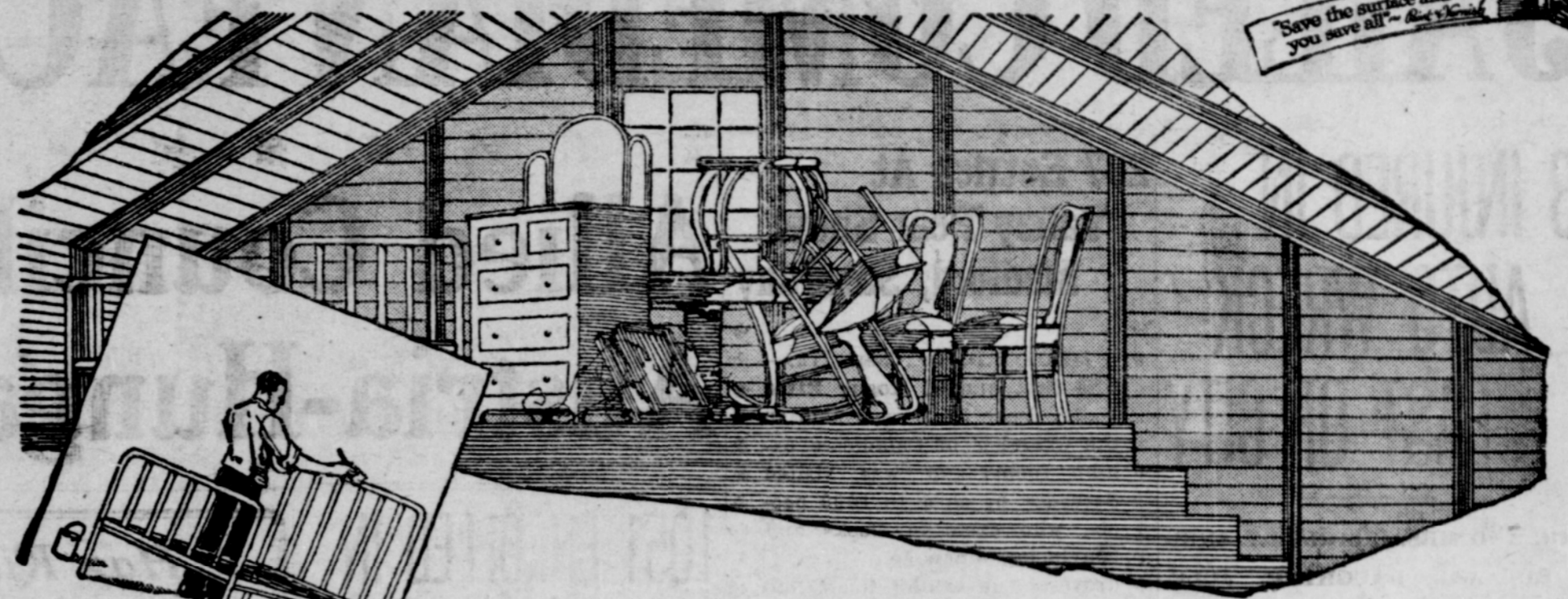
Section 25. Whereas the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon has submitted to the people of the state of Oregon, a constitutional amendment to be known as "Article XIc" of the constitution of the state of Oregon, providing for the issuance of bonds of the state of Oregon not exceeding three per cent of the as-

essed valuation of all property in the state for the purpose of creating a fund to be used in the industrial rehabilitation of world war veterans by providing a bonus or loan to such veterans and also specifically authorizing a special tax levy not to exceed two mills upon each dollar of valuation of all taxable property within the state to provide for the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds, which tax levy shall not be computed in the revenue raised by taxation, which is subject to the tax limitation of section 11, article XI of the constitution of the state of Oregon; and whereas it is necessary to provide by statute for the issuance of said bonds and for the application of the proceeds thereof and for the levying of such tax; therefore, upon the adoption of said constitutional amendment by the people this act shall apply to and regulate the issue of said bonds and the levy of such tax and the application of the proceeds thereof.

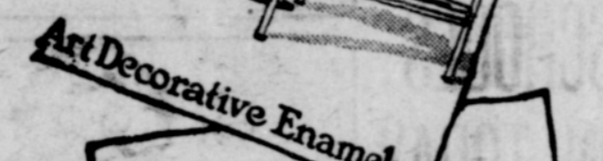
Section 26. The secretary of state is hereby authorized and directed to set aside, for an affirmative argument on this act or measure, two pages of the official pamphlet containing proposed initiative and referendum measures to be voted upon at the election at which this act is submitted. A committee consisting of two senators and three representatives, to be appointed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house of representatives, respectively, shall be named to prepare and file with the secretary of state such affirmative argument.
