APPLICATION FOR CASH BONUS OR LOAN

To the World War Veterans' State Aid Commission, Salem, Oregon.

In accordance with the provisions of the Oregon Loan and Bonus law (chapter 201, General Laws of Oregon, 1921) I hereby make application for the benefits thereof as hereinafter indicated, and in support of such application, I make the following statement of facts:

 This side of Glendale we had to detour, and one car got stranded on a steep hill because he failed to take oil in his (lamp) car at the last station. We held up a dozen or more tourists before we finally got to the top of the hill.
 One lady, with her husband, drove up and saw so many cars waiting to go on, said, "Do you serve lunch up here?" We told her, no, but we were feeling the need of some lunch about then.

Breeds New Fowl To Meet Demand For White Eggs

To satisfy the demands of those who want white eggs—or rather eggs with a white shell—the United States Department of Agriculture has been able, through one of its experts in the Bureau of Animal Industry, to breed a new fowl, which combines the heavy meaty qualities of the Plymouth Rock with the white eggs of the white leghorn.
 The white leghorns are a light fowl and are not popular with the farmers, who want good laying stock with plenty of meat on them. The call for white eggs is an important factor in poultry raising. Several of the best markets of the country, notably New York City demand eggs with a white shell and are willing to pay a premium for them. The new fowl, which is called the Lamona in honor of Henry M. Lamona, who has spent nine years in breeding it, combines the two desirable qualities—white eggs and plenty of meat.
 The following steps were taken in breeding the Lamona: Mr. Lamona began with a silver-grey Dorking hen and a white Plymouth Rock rooster. Their chickens were bred to a single comb white leghorn.
 A careful selection of the chickens so bred was made and the process of inter-breeding begun until a type which seemed ideal, was reached. Other points sought in the Lamona were yellow skin, yellow legs, red comb and four-toed feet. These requirements lengthened the process, which took nine years.

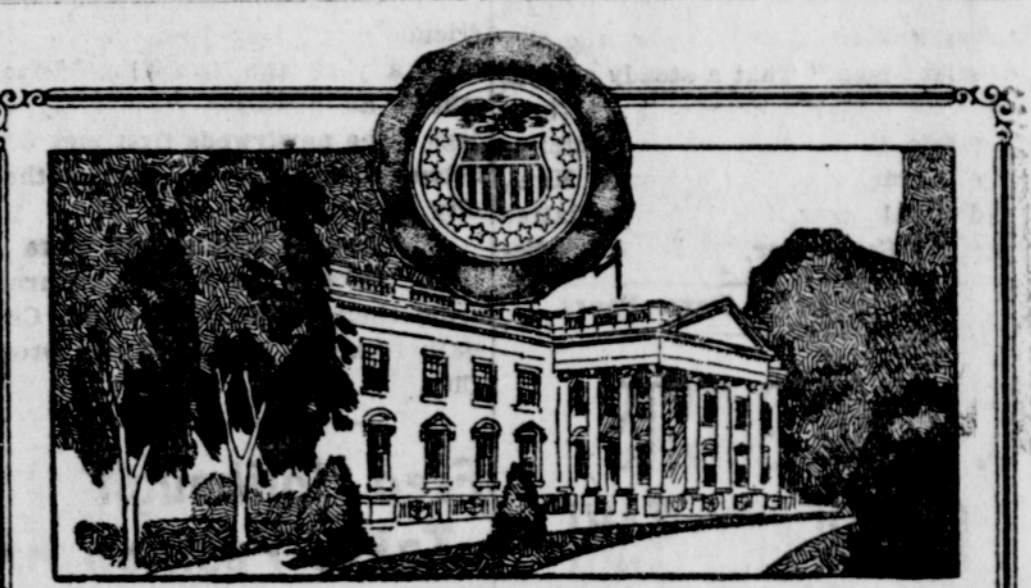
