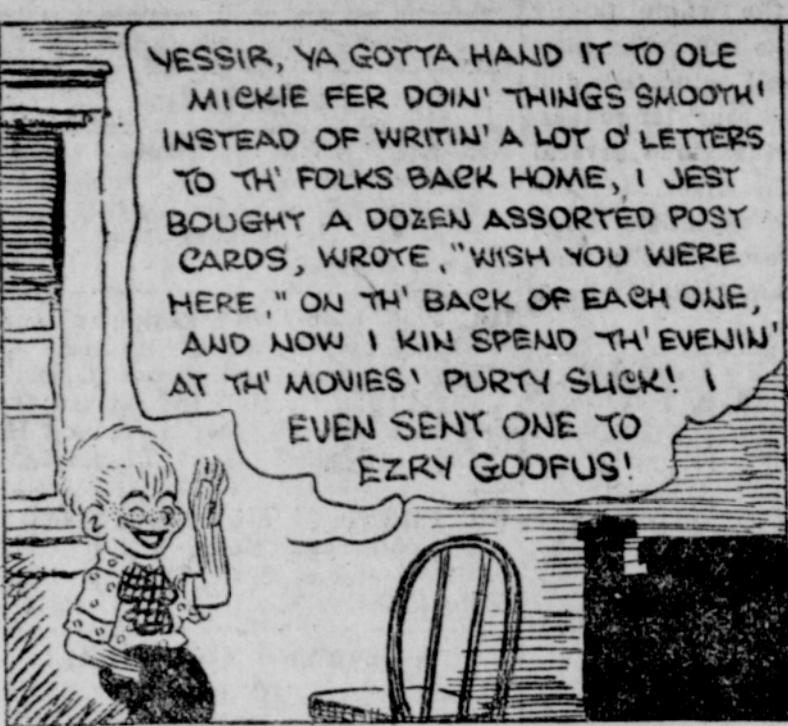

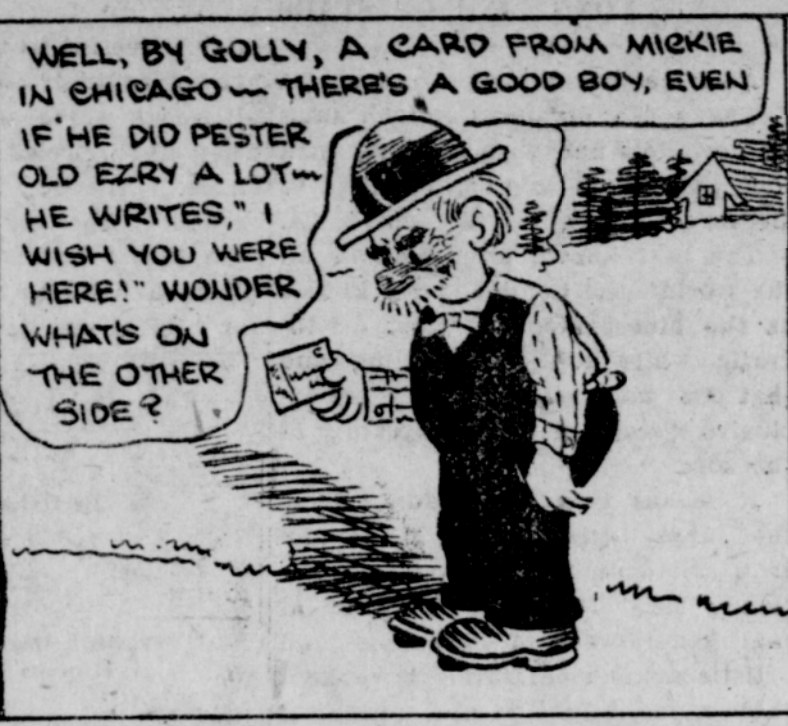

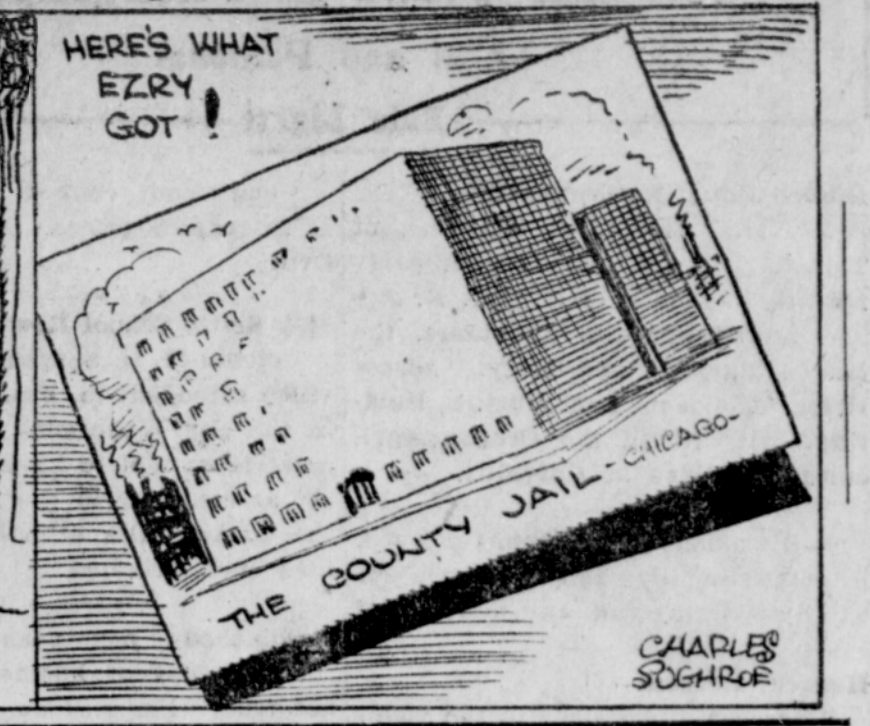

LICENSE LAWS WARNING GIVEN BY C. E. TERRILL

For the convenience of those motor vehicle owners of Jackson county who are desirous of operating their motor vehicles during the period of application to the secretary of state for registration and the receipt of permanent license plates, C. E. Terrill, sheriff, has been designated by the secretary of state to issue temporary license plates to such persons only, who shall make and file their applications for permanent licenses through the sheriff's office for forwarding to the secretary of state.

Therefore any person desiring such temporary license shall fill out the regular form of application blank for permanent license, and deposit with the sheriff the license fee and application, together with a deposit of \$1 and such person shall receive a set of temporary license cards which shall be valid for ten days. And upon returning the temporary license cards the person shall be entitled to the \$1 deposit.

It is unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle upon the public highways or streets of any city or town without the permanent or temporary license plates above mentioned.

SPOKANE PATROLMAN IS WOUNDED IN PITCHED BATTLE WITH BANDITS

SPOKANE, Wash., Sept. 16.—In a pitched battle early this morning between Spokane police and six or seven yeggmen who had attempted to blow the safe of a bank in Reardon, Patrolman Allison was shot in the leg.

The bandits were scared away from the bank before they had secured any loot, and started towards Spokane in an automobile. They were met by four officers three miles from the city. Both sides opened fire and Allison fell with the first volley. The yeggmen were chased into the prairie where a posse of fifty officers are trying to surround them.

Insurgent Plans Are Revealed By Police in Berlin

BERLIN, Sept. 15.—A revolutionary organization with national ramifications involving military interests, monarchists and anti-Semites, who were pledged to "remove" the objectionable republicans and work against the republican government, has been discovered by the police, it was revealed today.

The persons behind the organization is said by the police to have been responsible for the assassination of Mathias Erzberger. Many arrests have been made, especially in Bavaria, which is said to be a hotbed of royalist agitation. Some of the prisoners were former soldiers who participated in the Von Kapp revolution in March, 1920. Others are former naval officers.

ACCORDING to the ruling of the Oregon Dairy and Food Commission all dairy butter sold or exposed for sale in this state must be wrapped in butter paper upon which is printed the words "Oregon Dairy Butter, 16 (or 32) ounces full weight," with the name and address of the maker.

To enable patrons of the Tidings to easily comply with this ruling this office has put in a supply of the standard sizes of butter paper and will print it in lots of 100 sheets and upward and deliver it by parcels post at the following prices:
