Assisted the farmers of Jackson county in financing a cow testing association. Added an extra room to the Chamber of Commerce office and redecorated the same. Held an average of two forum luncheons per month during the summer. Entertained a group of Klamath Falls business men in a "Get-Together" luncheon at the Hotel Ashland. Visited the auto camp frequently.

At the beginning of the civil war, Aden enlisted in Company A, First Oregon cavalry, which got its training at Camp Jackson, near Jacksonville, and with this troop saw service guarding emigrant trains across Montana, Idaho and eastern Oregon. After the close of the civil war Aden returned to Ashland and followed the various occupations of freighter and carpenter until 1869, when in company with W. C. Myers he went with a herd of Oregon horses east to the markets in Kansas. While there he met and married Isabelle Porter. To the union eight sons and three daughters were born, of whom five sons and two daughters are living and were present at the dinner Sunday. Aden and Mrs. Spencer are active workers in the G. A. R. and W. R. C., and have three sons with enviable records in the Legion work.

(Continued from Page 1) The grain movement is also very large. As the movement of these products continues, the prices continue to improve. Kelly, Sparks and Ingram were here today in charge of George N. Kramer, Ashland agent for the railroad. The visitors were gratified to learn of the improvement in business conditions here. "We have a vital interest in the well-being of this district," said Kelly. "The Southern Pacific wants to do what it can to assist the development of this splendid region. In line with this it is interesting to note that Southern Pacific taxes in Jackson county amount to \$110,000 a year, and that the monthly payroll in Ashland amounts to \$85,000." The Southern Pacific payroll in Oregon amounts to more than \$11,000,000 a year; its purchases, \$4,500,000, and its taxes \$1,100,000.
