THE TRUTH ABOUT SELLS-FLOTO CLOWNS NOT SO VERY STARTLING, EH?

We've all heard of the clown who reads Chaucer. Oh yes, the busy little fellows ahead of the circus have seen to that. As a matter of fact, there aren't any clowns who read Chaucer. They read about politics and baseball; and the way they go after current events for ideas upon which to frame their acts is a lesson to direct action.

Clowns are not, as has so often been stated, exceptionally moody chaps when out of the ring. In fact, they are just ordinary fellows, much the same as you and I. Some of them are well read, of course, and well educated. "Poodles" Hanneford, the greatest of all riding clowns, with Sells-Floto circus, coming to Medford on Saturday, September 24, is a Harrow boy, and that's something on the other side. Of the fifty-five clowns with the "second largest show on earth," forty-three are Americans, almost all of them high school graduates, some of them college men, but they're not "high brows." Hardly.

Action was taken to make repairs on a wooden bridge at Mountain avenue and B street, where, it was stated, danger has existed for some time because of a recent fire which partially destroyed supporting timbers of the structure.

In accordance with a petition presented by Earl Hosler, water super-

intendent, I. D. Pittman was granted a ten days vacation.

Ira Shoudy, O. Winter and W. F. Loomis were appointed as a board of viewers to assess the benefits and damages of property effected by the proposed Mead street sewer.

The council refused an offer of the Oscar Huber company to sell a large road roller, the purchase of which has been considered at a previous council meeting. The offer was refused because the city has access to the roller used in county road work. The purchase of a patching outfit, however, was advised by City Engineer Walker. A bill of \$394.54 presented by the Oscar Huber company for city street work, was approved by the council.
