American Legion Kolum

A large number of ex-service men have taken advantage of the American Legion bonus committee's work and filed their applications with the state commission. We are considerably gratified to note the large percentage of them who are making claim for the loan in preference to the cash bonus. We realize that the loan is a community asset, as well as a material benefit to the men themselves over and above the slight benefits derived from the cash bonus.

If the applicant is not in immediate need of the cash, we would advise him to talk with the committee and other members of the post and learn of the real benefits that will come with the loan. Come out to the ex-service men's sparty next Tuesday night and talk it over. Bring your wives and mothers and daughters and sisters along with you and have a regular time. It's for all of you.
