COOPERATION IS URGED BY OREGON PROHIBITION AGENT

SALEM, Or., Sept. 24.—Reciprocity of effort and co-operation among the various law enforcement bodies of the state, county and federal government are necessary to eliminate the wily still operator and bootlegger, said Dr. Joseph A. Linville, recently appointed prohibition director for Oregon, at a conference with sheriffs of Marion, Yamhill, Polk, Washington, Clackamas and Tillamook counties here.

Dr. Linville said it was not the purpose of his office to make any drastic promises at present with relation to the enforcement of the prohibition statutes. He declared his first move would be to confer with the various law enforcement agencies and, if possible, build up a spirit of co-operation that would prove a continual menace to the welfare-law violators. With this accomplished, Dr. Linville said, the first real step toward ridding Oregon of the illicit liquor traffic would have been taken.

Dr. Linville explained that his office did not have a large amount of money available for law enforcement purposes, and that nine field men comprised his entire force at present. Because of this, he said, it would be necessary for his office to seek the assistance of all county, state and municipal officers. Reciprocity and co-operation among these agencies, he said, would result in building up a law enforcement machine in Oregon second to none in the United States.

F. B. Mitchell, legal adviser for Dr. Linville said that, under the state code, he believed automobiles could be searched without a warrant when the officers were convinced that they were carrying liquor in violation of the law. When invading private homes he advised, the officers to carry search warrants in compliance with recent legal interpretations of the Volstead act. Sheriffs present at the conference

expressed a desire to co-operate with the state prohibition director and offered agencies to assist in bringing violators to justice.

Sheriffs in attendance at the conference included William J. Wilson, Clackamas county; F. B. Ferguson, Yamhill; John W. Orr, Polk; Ascar Bower, Marion; George Alexander, Washington, and John Aschin, Tillamook.

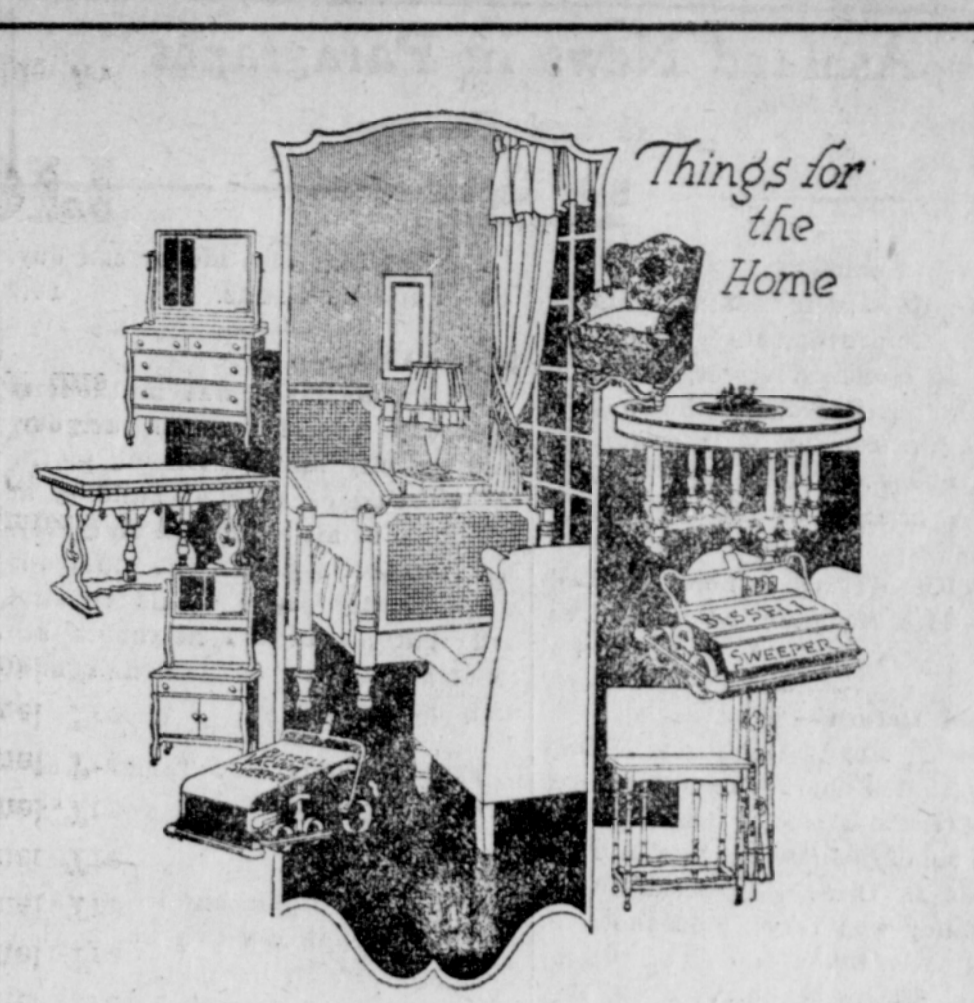
