Calling for bids on bonds of the City of Ashland, Oregon, in the aggregate of approximately Sixty-three Thousand Dollars (\$63,000.00). Notice is hereby given, That by virtue of a resolution passed by the Common Council of the City of Ashland on the 23rd day of September, 1921, the Common Council of the City of Ashland will, at eight o'clock P. M., October 11, 1921, proceed to consider sealed bids on bonds to be issued by the City of Ashland, Oregon, which bonds are particularly described as follows, to-wit:

First: Certain bonds to be known as "Improvement Refunding Bonds", aggregating \$37,000.00, said bonds to be 74 in number; denomination, \$500.00 each; to be dated December 1, 1921, and to mature December 1, 1931; to bear interest at the rate of 6% per annum; to be payable at the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City, and being general obligation bonds of said City. These bonds are not optional.

Second: Certain bonds to be known as "Improvement Bonds" (not Bancroft), aggregating \$5,500.00; said bonds to be in the denomination of \$500.00 each and numbered from one to eleven, inclusive; said bonds to be dated December 1, 1921, and to mature December 1, 1931; to bear interest at the rate of 6% per annum; to be payable at the office of the City Treasurer of the City of Ashland, Oregon; being general obligation bonds of the said City. Said bonds are optional bonds and the City reserves the right to take up and cancel said bonds on the payment of the face value thereof with interest accrued to date of payment, at or after five years from the date of the said bonds.

Third: Certain (Bancroft) Improvement Bonds, aggregating \$2887.12; to be dated December 1, 1921; to bear interest at the rate of 6% per annum; to be payable at the office of the City Treasurer of said City; bonds to be numbered from 771 to 780, both inclusive; the denomination of bonds numbered from 771 to 779, both inclusive, to be \$300.00 each, and bond numbered 780 to be in the amount of \$187.12; and to be otherwise in the usual form of statutory Bancroft Bonds.

Fourth: Certain bonds in the nature of refunding bonds (not yet specifically named and not yet voted), to aggregate approximately \$15,000.00, to be applied to the repaying of various loans for miscellaneous purposes made by certain Special Funds of said City and also to be applied to the paying of any

possible discount, legal expenses and printing of all the bonds in this notice mentioned, said bonds to be dated December 1, 1921, and to mature December 1, 1931; to bear interest at the rate of 8% per annum; to be general obligation bonds; to be made payable at the office of the Fiscal Agency of the State of Oregon in New York City. Said bonds are not optional.

Bonds mentioned in paragraphs enumerated one to three, inclusive hereof, have already been authorized and bonds mentioned in paragraph four hereof are to be voted on by the electors of the City of Ashland at a future date, consequently, it must be understood that bids on the bonds mentioned in paragraph four are conditional upon the favorable outcome of the said election.

All bonds heretofore mentioned will have an approving opinion of the City Attorney of the City of Ashland and bonds mentioned in paragraphs one and four hereof will also have an approving opinion furnished by the City of Ashland of Teal, Minor & Winfree, Attorneys of Portland, Oregon; all bids will be made in writing and be accompanied with a certified check in the sum of at least \$300.00; said bid; and certified check must be placed in a sealed envelope, addressed to the City Recorder of the City of Ashland, Oregon, and recorded on file in the office of said Recorder not later than five P. M. of the date of the consideration of said bids, i. e., October 11, 1921.

In case of the acceptance of any bid and the failure of the bidder to take the bonds bid for at the proper time, the amount of the certified check may, at the option of the Common Council, be declared forfeited to the City of Ashland; bids may be made on all of the above mentioned bonds or upon any part thereof.

The Common Council of the City of Ashland reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Any further information regarding said bonds may be obtained at the office of the City Recorder of Ashland, Oregon. Dated this 24th day of September, 1921.

ACCORDING to the ruling of the Oregon Dairy and Food Commission all dairy butter sold or exposed for sale in this state must be wrapped in butter paper upon which is printed the words "Oregon Dairy Butter, 16 (or 32) ounces full weight," with the name and address of the maker.

To enable patrons of the Tidings to easily comply with this ruling this office has put in a supply of the standard sizes of butter paper and will print it in lots of 100 sheets and upward and deliver it by parcels post at the following prices:
