Jobless Men to Picket Conference And White House

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 30.—Fifty "human documents" of unemployment reached the capital this morning by motor truck from New York, Philadelphia and Baltimore. Their sponsor, Urban Ledoux, "shepherd of the shorn lambs of labor," announced that the men will picket the national unemployment conference and that later they will "sit at the threshold of the White House."

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 30.—Despite the widespread unemployment, the department of labor is now confronted with more labor troubles than at any time since the armistice. Secretary of Labor Davis announced today.
