Methodist Hold 82nd Conference Session at Chicago

CHICAGO, Oct. 4.—The eighty-second session of the Rock River conference of the Methodist Episcopal church began today in the Thornburn Methodist Episcopal church here. The sessions will continue until October 11.

As the Rock River conference is the second largest of the Methodist churches in the United States, many delegates arrived last night and more were registering today.

Bishop Thomas Nicholson is the presiding officer of the session, assisted by District Superintendent Polumus H. Swift and Rev. John H. DeLaney, pastor of the Thornburn church and the conference host.

Important changes in pastorates of Methodist churches will be announced by Bishop Nicholson on the closing day of the conference.

One of the outstanding features of the seven-day program will be a course of lectures by Prof. Harry F. Ward, of the Union Theological seminary, on the topic "The Future of the Church in Modern Industry." They will be delivered on three days, starting tomorrow, and will be open to the public.

Participation of laymen in the conference this year was expected to be larger than ever before, because of the growth of the centenary movement. Meetings of the laymen's electoral conference and the laymen's association, the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary societies, have been arranged.
