Mr. Koon refused to advance any definite opinion regarding the system without an investigation. He stated that very few filters were used in city water systems. A settling tank, under certain conditions, he said, would clear the water. In outlining his plans, Mr. Koon presented a blank form of the potential written agreement with the city. The agreement called for an engineer's report before a mass meeting of citizens. Mr. Koon favored the use of meters, stating: "It'servoir, the water is waster, water out meters, and you must have water that will go through meters if you expect to install them."

A large still will be introduced as evidence by the government in this case.
