## Will Call Petit Jury For Circuit Court, Oct. 24th

JACKSONVILLE, Oct. 7.—The petit jury for the October term of the circuit court will be called Monday, October 24, and the grand jury will be convened a week earlier, October 17.

Among the cases to be considered by the grand jury are those of Rollie Matthews, charged with manslaughter as a result of the shooting of "Wig" Jacks at Eagle Point, and the bootlegging allegations growing out of the series of raids conducted in Medford last August.

All these cases, if true bills are returned, will come before the petit jury; also the trial of four Bank of Jacksonville failure cases, to-wit: Those of Myrtle Blakeley, former county treasurer; Charles Owen, former orchardist, now of Salt Lake City; R. D. Hines, ex-assistant cashier of the defunct bank, and Chester C. Kubik, Applegats rancher.

The court sessions are expected to last a month, and there is a long calendar of civil cases.

## Federal Court Returns Guilt Verdict, Distiller

MEDFORD, Or., Oct. 7.—Yesterday morning a jury in the federal court returned a verdict of guilty in the case of Ed Jason, indicted for the alleged possession of a still. The jury reached a verdict at 9 o'clock Wednesday night and it was returned sealed, and opened and read at the opening of court.

The still was found back of the ranch of the defendant at Plush, Klamath county, and wagon tracks of the series of raids conducted in Medford last August.

The case of Fred Hood, a Klamath Indian, charged with cattle stealing, was begun yesterday morning, and involves, among other things, a red cow, described as "a common cow, too poor to kill," and branded with the "OT" and "TC" brands. It, with twelve others, was purchased about June 30, 1920, by Utter & Castiel, butchers of Fort Klamath. A lone cow was purchased on June 12. Checks in payment of the stock were introduced as evidence.

## Large Sum Paid State Treasurer For Land Sales

SALEM, Or., Oct. 7.—The state land department paid over to the state treasurer in September a total of \$113,154.48, according to a report issued by George G. Brown, clerk of the state land board. The payments included the following:
