LONDON, Oct. 7.—England has had two disastrous coal strikes since the war ended, and sundry other threats.

The South Wales regional survey committee, a branch of the ministry of health, thinks living in depressive conditions, huddled like ants in dirty valleys at the pit mouths has a direct bearing on unrest. They propose to remedy the living conditions and alleviate the unrest by a new housing scheme.

South Wales is engaged in mining, the committee finds, and mining is concentrated in valleys unfitted for housing purposes, with all the serious disadvantages of the coal dust and smoke nuisance and serious pollution of rivers. Housing of miners outside the valleys and off the coal measures is, therefore, proposed, and the committee suggests fifteen localities as centers for grouped housing schemes to serve particular valleys or groups of valleys. It should be built away from the industrial centers, it should be almost purely residential in character, the residents should belong to different industries, and the size of the town should be definitely limited by a permanent agricultural belt within its own boundaries. The committee recommends the immediate development of dormitory towns at Llantrisant station and at Bridgend. The former would be a town of about 30,000 population under the proposed Utopian plans.
