Talent, will commence the packing of apples in its big cannery building in Talent the last of this week. Later it is understood the making of its famous apple juice will begin, and as has been done the past three years, thousands of cans of the beverage will be shipped to all parts of the United States. The drink has gained a wide reputation and has been sold in carload lots in all our western cities and in the far east.

The second annual open-house program was held at the Talent school last Friday evening, September 30. One of the largest crowds ever assembled in the school auditorium enjoyed the splendid program given by the school children. The affair was in the nature of a get-acquainted meeting for the people of the community and the new teachers. Following the program, light refreshments of punch and wafers were served.
