To Prevent Peach Blight—

Peach growers are finding it necessary to spray with Bordeaux 401-50 in the summer or early in the fall in order to prevent the destructive winter attack of peach blight. This disease is responsible for more peach orchard destruction in Oregon than any other single cause, but it can easily be controlled by Bordeaux applied at the right time, providing every twig and bud are covered. The same spray should be used for cankered pear trees.—O. A. C. Experiment Station.
