BANKS TO BUILD TUNNELS TO FOOL BANDITS

CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—Plans to foil Chicago's bank bandits by building subterranean passages from bank to bank within the "loop" are underway. The first "bandit proof" tunnel will connect with the Federal Reserve bank with the new Illinois Trust and Savings company. Similar underground channels are being planned for the Corn Exchange National bank, the Merchants' Loan and Trust company and the Continental Commercial bank. The tunnels will be used by messengers carrying large sums of cash from one bank to the other. This will eliminate the necessity of messengers walking on the streets with the fortunes carried in bags. Numerous street holdups in recent years first caused the consideration of tunnels. If the first one proves practical, a score of banks probably will extend the network underground.
