out the middle west. The shipments are sold by consignments, \$1 a box being paid by the eastern jobbers when placed in the cars at Ashland. The difference is paid after the shipments reach Chicago, the amount depending on the market value when the apples are sold. All shipments of apples are traced to enable the association to give the grower the actual price brought by his crop of apples. Apples from different orchards are kept entirely separate. The average carload of apples is between 650 and 750 boxes. With a total shipment of eleven carloads, the pear season is practically over. Ten cars have been

shipped since the beginning of the season in August and one carload will be shipped to New York next week.
