TRY THIS ONE A. Sutherland, friend of Prune Picklins, today sent us the following recipe for home brew and, knowing Sutherland as we do, we desire to pass it on to our readers: Chase a wild bullfrog three miles and gather up the hops. To the hops add the following: Ten gallons extract of tanbark, one-half pint shellac, one bar home-made soap. Other parts: Extract of jimson, 6 drams; nicotine, 7 ounces; sulphuric extract of hellefire, 1 fluid ounce. Boil mixture thirty-six hours, then strain through an I. W. W. sock to keep it from working; then bottle in fruit jars; add one grasshopper to each pint to give it the kick. Shake well before using.

PRESBYTERY OF SOUTHERN OREGON HEL DAT ROGUE RIVER

(Continued from Page One) of Rev. J. W. Hoyt, who recently moved from Ashland to Walla Walla, Wash. Rev. H. G. Hanson, pastor of the Grants Pass church, has also recently removed, to take charge of the Presbyterian church at Moro, Or. On Tuesday evening five men from the Phoenix church, with their wives, attended the meeting at Rogue River, when Rev. E. W. Warington gave a stirring and most interesting address on "Evangelism," and Rev. E. P. Lawrence, pastor of the Medford church, spoke on the "New Era" work of the church. A number of Medford people also were present and several from Phoenix on Wednesday evening, when Rev. C. F. Koehler, of Ashland, presided. The presbytery took decided action favoring disarmament, and also the admission of women to the of-

lice of deacons in the churches, but opposing a two-year term for commissioners to the general assembly, which meets annually—next year at Des Moines, Iowa. This year the meeting was at Winona Lake, Ind., and was attended by nearly 1,000 delegates from all the states of the union and from foreign countries. Rev. E. P. Lawrence and Dr. W. P. Holt, of Medford, were nominated for such commissioners for the meeting at Des Moines next year.

(Continued from Page 1) He said Welleck and Isson rode down the road together. Long said there was something under the wagon seat which the government maintains was the still found by Gunner Jolson.

\$500 for One Barrel

Sam Welleck was the first witness for the government, and described in detail his start in moonshining, and the making of the still, which he assembled before the jury.

Welleck said that the readjustment period left its mark on him, and that one day while talking to Brumfield he remarked that "unless things picked up he would have to start making whiskey."

He said Brumfield told him he would give \$500 for a barrel of whiskey, and that afterward Brumfield furnished a still (the small one Gunner Jolson testified he found) and the ingredients—corn, cracked corn, cornmeal and brown sugar.

Welleck testified he took the still to his home and started experimenting, but could produce nothing but a "poor grade of vinegar."

Later, after this failure, Welleck testified that Brumfield told him he had a man who knew how to make whiskey, and that the one they had was too small "to do any good with commercially." He then alleged that Isson, the special game warden, then came to his house and made the still introduced as an exhibit, and described minutely and in whole just how it was made, and how the corn was spread on the roof of the porch to sprout, after soaking all night in a nearby creek.

According to Welleck, the method followed was to mix cornmeal boiled to the thickness of mush with hot water and brown sugar. Before the still was operated the officer seized it. Under the plan
