Mail Box Day

October 19 is "national mail receptacle and house number day" with all the postoffices throughout the United States. The city carriers of the Ashland postoffice will, after the completion of the work on that day, submit to the postmaster every dwelling or place of business on the carriers' routes that is not properly numbered, that contains no number, and that is not properly equipped with a mail receptacle. Numbers that are hidden from view from the sidewalk or street also are to be submitted, as a number should be so placed that it can be readily seen from the street at all seasons of the year. The department realizes that a prompt and efficient delivery of mail requires the co-operation of the patrons who are interested in an economically-administered mail service. Patrons concerned who do not know their street numbers accurately should consult their city letter carrier or the office of City Engineer F. T. Walker.
