D. A. R. Dedicate Highway Marker To Pioneer '46

Daughters of the American Revolution, members of the Mount Ashland chapter of this city, and the Crater Lake chapter of Medford, gathered at Phoenix, near the old Culver home, this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock for the dedication of a highway marker honoring the fifteen pioneers of 1846 who established the first road to the Rogue River valley. The marker, a shaft of Oregon granite surmounted by a bronze tablet, was erected by the D. A. R. of this city and Medford at a cost of \$350.

The principal address of the afternoon was given by C. E. Gates, mayor of Medford, who dedicated the marker. Mrs. Gordon MacCracken, regent of the Mount Ashland chapter, delivered an address embodying a history of the D. A. R. organizations, both locally and throughout the state. Mrs. Van Scoyoc gave the prayer of George Washington.

Congratulations on the work of the D. A. R. chapters of this city and Medford were received this morning by telegram from Mrs. John A. Keating, state regent for the D. A. R., at Portland by Mrs. MacCracken. Mrs. Keating commended the efforts of both chapters and expressed the hope, "May the spirit of the pioneers go marching on."

Mrs. MacCracken stated that, although the Mount Ashland chapter has only been organized for a year, the dedication taking place on the first anniversary, the local chapter has forty-four members and the Medford chapter thirty-three.
