PEPPERMINT PARAGRAPHS

Not many people realize how valuable the peppermint plant is when raised as a business.

From forty to eighty pounds of oil is recovered from an acre of peppermint.

The distillation of peppermint oil is very simple and inexpensive and the still does not get a man in jail or the poor house.

There are many hundreds of thousands of pounds of mint oil used annually in chewing gum.

The Klamath county mint growers sold one barrel of peppermint oil last fall for over \$4,000. So one can see mint coins money, even if not in Philadelphia, New Orleans or San Francisco.

Several mint growers of the Willamette valley have moved to Klamath county and are planting mint on land reclaimed, formerly a marsh.

Mint roots are planted in furrows about three feet apart in similar manner as spuds, the "seed" being roots.

Three carloads of roots passed through Ashland for Klamath Falls recently.

The mint hay, after having the oil steamed or distilled out of it, is equal to alfalfa for stock feed.

NEW OREGON JUSTICE IN ROBES OCTOBER 31

SALEM, Or., Oct. 22.—Justice John L. Rand, new appointee to the state supreme court to succeed the late Justice Henry L. Benson, will sit for the first time with the court when it meets at Pendleton for the semi-annual term of the supreme court for eastern Oregon. The session will convene October 31. Justice Rand has been instructed by Chief Justice Burnett to meet with the court at that time, and he will not appear in Salem prior to that date.
