**To Develop Water Power**

For the development of a 1,300-horsepower waterpower site on Anna creek, in Crater Lake National forest, just south of the national park boundary, the Fort Klamath Meadows company has made application for a permit from the federal water-power commission, through the district engineer's office of the United States forest service. The company proposes a flume along the right bank one and one-half miles long. The proposed power will be used on 27,000 acres of reclaimed and irrigated land for use as light and power at mills and residences.

**PEPPERMINT PARAGRAPHS**

One acre such as the Klamath reclaimed land yields an average of forty pounds in a series of years. The average price of mint oil to manufacture for many years, with the exception of a year during the late war, has been a little better than \$3 per pound. During the last year of the war the price of peppermint oil was as high as \$9 per pound. Chewing gum manufacturers use up over 500,000 pounds of peppermint oil per annum. That would be 12,500 acres' worth. Since the breaking out of Germany, Americans have discovered that colors of dye are made fast by use of peppermint oil. It costs 15 cents per pound to distill peppermint oil. Cultivating of mint is about the same amount of labor as alfalfa. Mint growers from the Willamette valley are locating in Klamath county and predict it to become the center of mint-oil production for the world. Contractors furnish roots and put ground in shape and plant for \$40 per acre. The yield the first year is usually about \$40 to \$50 per acre.

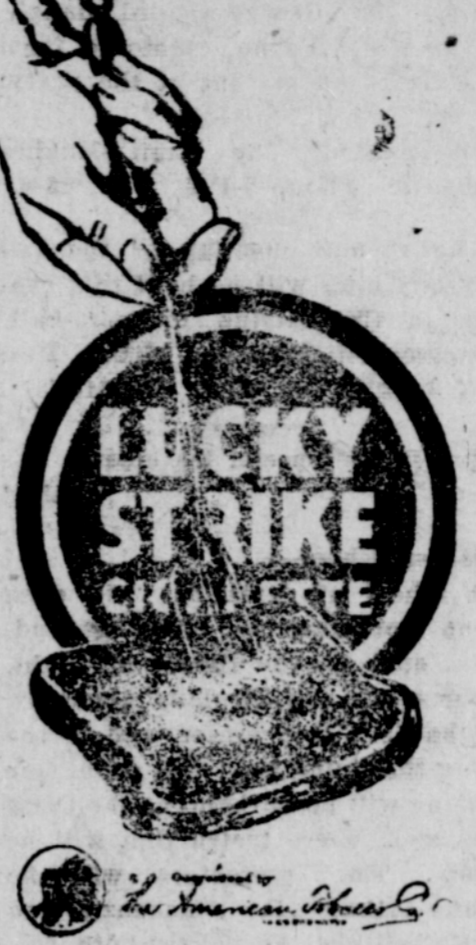
