RESOLUTION. Calling a Special Election of the Electors of the City of Ashland to be held on the 2nd day of November, 1921.

AN ACT. To amend an Act entitled "An Act to amend an Act entitled 'An Act to incorporate the City of Ashland, in Jackson County, Oregon, and to define the powers thereof, filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 21, 1889, and the Acts approved February 25, 1895, amending the same,' filed in the office of the Secretary of State October 14, 1898, as amended by an Act approved February 15, 1901, and as amended by an Act filed in the office of the Secretary of State January 31, 1903, and as amended by an Act filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 3, 1903, and as amended by an Act filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 21, 1905, and as amended by the legal voters of said City at elections held subsequent to the year 1898 and as amended by all Acts amending said Act adopted by the Legislative Assembly or by vote of the people.

Be it enacted by the City of Ashland, That an Act entitled "An Act to amend an Act entitled 'An Act to incorporate the City of Ashland, in Jackson County, Oregon, and to define the powers thereof, filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 21, 1889, and the Acts approved February 25, 1895, amending the same,' filed in the office of the Secretary of State October 14, 1898, as amended by an Act approved February 15, 1901, and as amended by an Act filed in the office of the Secretary of State January 31, 1903, and as amended by an Act filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 3, 1903, and as amended by an Act filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 21, 1905, and as amended by the legal voters of said City at elections held subsequent to the year 1898, and as amended by all Acts amending said Act adopted by the Legislative Assembly or by vote of the people, be and the same hereby is amended by adding thereto to Article XXIII, to read as follows:

ARTICLE XXIII. Section 1. For the purpose of funding the indebtedness of the City of Ashland incurred through the cost of paving street intersections in Ashland Street and Boulevard Paving District aggregating approximately \$1855.37 and through the cost of extra grading in Ashland Street and Boulevard Paving District aggregating approximately \$1650.50, and through the extra cost of paving Mill Street or Park Avenue (amount over the \$5,500 voted for this purpose) aggregating approximately \$2088.91, and through paying taxes, attorney's fees and expenses incident to foreclosure of properties against which the City has delinquent improvement liens aggregating approximately \$4,410.01, all of said amounts having been borrowed from the Water Sinking Fund, and for the purpose of funding the indebtedness of the City incurred through the widening of North Main Street between the Plaza

and Water Streets, being part of the cost of purchasing Houck Block aggregating approximately \$3360.00, which amount has been borrowed from the Electric Light Depreciation Fund, and for the purpose of funding the indebtedness of the City incurred by the Fire Department Fund borrowing from other funds aggregating approximately \$700.00, and for the purpose of funding the indebtedness of the City incurred by the Street Fund borrowing from other funds aggregating approximately \$2380.10 (which amount includes \$1020.85 paid for tractor), together with the accrued interest on said items of indebtedness, each and all of which said items of indebtedness are hereby expressly validated, the Council is hereby authorized and empowered to issue and sell, as in its judgment may seem best, general obligation bonds of said City in a sum not to exceed \$18,000, said bonds to bear date of issue to bear interest at not to exceed six per cent per annum, to mature in ten years from date of issue, said bonds to be in denominations of \$500 or \$1000 each; duly signed by the Mayor and countersigned by the Recorder under the corporate seal of the City, having semi-annual interest coupons attached thereto whereby the City shall be held in substance and effect to undertake and promise to pay the bearer of each of said bonds at maturity thereof the sum therein named in United States gold coin of the present standard of value with interest thereon in like gold coin at the office of the City Treasurer, which said bonds shall be known as "City of Ashland Funding Bonds."

Section 2. It shall be the duty of the City Recorder to see to the proper application of the funds derived from the sale of said bonds and the purchaser or purchasers thereof shall in no event be responsible or charged with the proper application of the funds derived from the sale thereof; and provided, also, that the debt limitations contained in the Charter of said City shall not apply to the bonds hereby authorized, and the surplus, if any, derived from the sale of said bonds shall be paid into the general fund of said City.

Section 3. The Council shall each year at the time of making the annual tax levy for City purposes, include in such levy a sum sufficient to pay interest due on the outstanding bonds of this issue, and to retire the principal amount thereof at maturity. Resolved further, That this Resolution for proposed Charter amendments submitted to the voters by the Council be filed with the Recorder of the City of Ashland upon its approval by the Mayor for submission to the legal voters of the said City for their rejection or approval to be voted upon at a special election which shall be and hereby is called to be held on the 2nd day of November, 1921, between the legal voting hours of said date, and that said time be and the same is hereby designated as the time for holding said special election, and the following named places be and they are hereby designated as the polling places for said election and the following named persons be and they are hereby designated and appointed as to be for the judges and clerks of election, to act at said polling places for said election on said date, to-wit:

Ward No. 1. Polling place, City Hall; A. E. Kinney, Chairman, and Mrs. Wm. M. Briggs and Josephine Crocker as Judges. Ward No. 2. Polling place, Fourth Street Fire Station; W. H. Gowdy, Chairman, and G. W. Trefren and O. Winter as Judges.

Resolved, further, That the City Attorney of said City of Ashland shall forthwith provide a ballot title for such proposed measure to be voted upon at said election as by law provided. Resolved, further, That the Recorder be and she hereby is instructed and required to publish the hereinabove proposed Charter amendments submitted to the voters by the Council in the manner required by law; that is to say, by publication of this Resolution in full, together with the ballot title, in a newspaper published in the City of Ashland for two consecutive publications in said newspaper within the ten days immediately preceding said Special Election, and also by giving notice of such election and appointment of Judges of election by publication in a newspaper published in the said City and by conspicuously posting a notice in each of the wards of said City not less than ten days prior to the election.

To amend the Charter of the City of Ashland, filed in the office of the Secretary of State February 21, 1889, and to amend all subsequent amendments thereto enacted by the Legislative Assembly or vote of people by adding Article XXIII, authorizing issue and sale of not to exceed \$18,000 bonds of said City to fund indebtedness incurred by loans from Water Sinking Fund, Electric Light Depreciation Fund, and other funds; from time to time to defray various City expenses, and providing tax to pay principal and interest.
