PEOPLE'S FORUM

Editor Ashland Tidings:
 In the interest of the welfare of the city, I wish to call the attention of Ashland citizens to the statement supplied by the mayor and council in the Forum column in last Wednesday's issue of the Tidings, with reference to the special election to be held on November 2.
 It seems to me that the statements made by the council are very clear, and that any one carefully reading them will be sure to favor the bond election. Often people do not take the trouble to inform themselves regarding measures to be voted upon, and for that reason I wish to emphasize the importance of carrying out the said election.
 The policy of the council has been not to call a special election each time funds were required for some special improvement, but to pay the cost of the improvement in question out of the funds on hand and not needed at the time. This has been a wise policy in that it saved the cost of several special elections, and it saved the city considerable interest in that it postponed borrowing until the funds were actually needed.
 Now that the funds are actually needed to meet other obligations, and the bonds have been bargained for at a very favorable price, the only logical and businesslike thing to do is to vote the bonds, and meet the obligations of the city now maturing.
