Receive Mail Route Bids—Bids on all the star mail routes in Oregon for carrying mail for the four year period beginning July 1, 1922, are asked for by the postoffice department, and blank proposals for such bids in Jackson county have been received in Medford by Postmaster William J. Warner. They can be obtained by prospective bidders from him. The bidding will remain open until 4:30 p. m. on January 10 next, and the decisions will be announced on or before February 14. Each successful contractor must furnish a bond for the four year period.
