## PRIVATE INTEREST HERE AID FOR CO. ATTORNEY MOORE

MEDFORD, Or., Nov. 2.—"Why I have not asked the county court to employ an attorney to assist me in the prosecution of the bootleg cases in circuit court is because it is my duty to prosecute such cases without incurring any needless expense to the taxpayers as long as I feel that I can successfully handle such cases," said District Attorney Rawles Moore in an interview. "It would be a different matter if I had lost several such cases and felt that I should have assistance in the prosecution of them.

"Some misguided people, ever since circuit court opened and they learned that I was to be pitted in the important bootleg cases against two attorneys for the defense, became needlessly alarmed in my opinion, and began to ask me to request the county court to provide an assistant in the prosecution. Not only that, but they began asking the county court to provide me an assistant prosecutor, and were informed by the court that such an assistant would be provided if I asked for one.

"The county court has always been very good to me in that way, and I felt all the time that if I wanted an assistant in the prosecution of the bootleg cases all I had to do was to ask for it. In fact, once or twice influenced by outsiders, Judge Gardner came to me and offered such counsel.

"My position is that I am hired by all the taxpayers to perform the duties of county attorney without unnecessary expense to them, and as long as I feel that I can look after the public interest without such an expense. Understand, I do not spurn extra legal help, but only the expense it would entail.

"But matters came to a head this morning when interested people came to the county court and offered to pay the expense out of their own pockets for a competent legal assistant for me in the prosecution of the bootleg cases, if I would accept such counsel.

"I do accept the proposition, in

fact, welcome it, as long as the expense comes out of private pockets and not the taxpayers generally."

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1.3 per cent for education, development, public health, research and similar projects.

These figures show the startling burden of armament. A real reduction in armament by the conference on limitation of armaments would lead to the saving of literally hundreds of millions of dollars annually for the American people.

The appropriations for armament this year are even greater than last year, being \$1,422,752,000. Of this amount \$771,530,000 went to the

army and \$551,222,000 to the navy. Great Britain's army and navy appropriation for 1921 aggregates \$1,121,318,000. Japan's appropriation is \$282,357,000. The total for these two countries is approximately \$19,000,000 lower than the amount spent by the United States. Of course the cost of labor is higher in the United States and it is probable that in actual results this country has less to show for its armament expenditures dollar by dollar than Great Britain or Japan, but the fact remains:

The United States is setting the pace in armaments.
