"When it is realized how large a part tropical and subtropical products play in modern in ustrial and commercial life. . seems natural that it should be the policy of Great Britain, the largest trading empire in the world, to get as great a share as possible of the raw materials and trade resources of the Far East, and she has pursued this policy with marked singleness of purpose ever since she acquired the Suez canal," he says. "To take a single instance—through her control of the free ports of Hongkong and Singapore, she has made London one of the chief world markets for rubber, tea, spices, jute, gums and hides.
