Tavener Buys Orchard— W. Tavener, a progressive Wright Creek rancher, has purchased Mrs. Anna Zeigler's nearby ten acre orchard tract, which has five acres of apple trees and two acres of cherries. Mr. Tavener came here from England nineteen years ago and during a good share of that time has on the Ashland mine road, near been making a living by dry land farming on a few acres of hill land Wright creek. For years Mr. Tavener had the use of water from an irrigation ditch, so he had an opportunity to compare the two systems of farming. He much prefers to raise fruit without artificial watering, claiming that equally good yields of cherries are obtained without irrigation, and that the fruit is of better quality when not irrigated. P. L. Ashcraft, who for years operated an irrigated orchard on Wimer street, is of the same opinion, having sold his city orchard a few years ago and bought a place near Mr. Tavener's. From the latter orchard this year, 248 pounds of cherries were picked from one ten year old tree. At ten cents per pound and 100 trees per acre, this would mean a gross yield of \$5000 per acre.
