BUSINESS SALES TAX

PROPOSAL BY SENATOR

SMOOT IS REJECTED

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 4.—

Senator Smoot's proposal of a business sales or turnover tax of two and one-half per cent was rejected by the senate today by a vote of 46 to 25. The defeat of the proposal followed the rejection last night of Senator Smoot's plan for a manufacturer's sales tax of one per cent. Twenty-two republican and twenty-four democrats voted against the business sales tax. The republicans cast all twenty-five votes for it.

ORCHARD HEATING TEST

INSTRUCTIVE, INTERESTING

The orchard heating demonstration that was held at the Bear Creek orchards Wednesday night of the Scheu smokeless heater was a marvel to all who witnessed the showing. Twelve heaters were placed on almost an acre of land, and the difference in temperature between the two rows of heaters was very pronounced. The heaters were placed six in a row and about seventy-five feet between the two rows. The temperature in the center of the heated area was four degrees warmer than the outside area. To my mind this was a marvelous showing due to the fact that such a small area was being heated. One reading taken three feet from the heater showed a temperature of 78 degrees. These heaters are practically smokeless and deserve the careful consideration of the orchardists.

REDUCTION OF ARMS TO LEAD SCIENTIFIC FUTURE WAR PLANS

arm, such nations as have the power of control and direction of their industrial development will quickly build it, in time of peace, toward the end that it shall be convertible to war use instantaneously. Germany, above all others in Europe, is such a nation.

Germany is defeated and helpless. Yet, it is pointed out, she had progressed farther in aeronautics than any other nation, and she is developing this science still further on a commercial basis, within the limits which the treaty allows. Also, Germany's monopoly in certain industries essential to warfare is such that Britain is making frantic efforts to encourage such key industries here by high protective tariffs. The anxiety of some officials has been so great in this respect that they have listed dolls' eyes among the favored and protected categories, winning the satirical plaudits of the opposition press.

With talk of reduction of armaments in the air, just a hint of the old pre-war and war-time theory of the German as a superman in science and the science of warfare is creeping back into the public prints. Just a hint, but it is enough to make some influential men "lean over backwards" on the question of disarmament.

The question in some minds hereabouts might be paraphrased, thus: If limitation of the known methods of warfare accelerates development of new methods and gives the highly organized industrial nation a

running start toward victory, should not the subject be approached with the most extreme caution?

This is primarily the reaction of the exponent of pure reason applied to international affairs. Practical statesmen who must find money, needs must weigh other considerations.

"EGG FACTORY" OF ASSOC. PRESIDENT WILL BE ENLARGED

is preparing to build a number of 540-egg incubators, which will mean a saving of one-half over ready-made prices.

How much is there in the chicken business? Smith was asked. From two to three dollars per hen, was the answer. His own net profits amounted to \$1,800 the past twelve months, which was a period of unusually low prices.

"Rogue River valley poultrymen have a great advantage in a splendid local market," said Mr. Smith. "Eggs are now being imported from as far north as Cottage Grove to supply the demand of Southern Oregon and northern California. The Weed Lumber company alone uses twenty cases of eggs per week.

"Last spring Ashland poultrymen were getting five to eight cents per dozen above the price paid in Portland. We have been urged to join the state poultry association, but that would, at times, mean a loss to us of around ten cents per dozen. When local production overtakes the demand, conditions will, of course, change.

"Ashland's climate and soil are peculiarly suited to the poultry busi-

ness. There is no reason why we cannot make this the Petaluma of Oregon. The possibilities of expansion are very great."

ern Pacific official. "If the building could overlook your beautiful park, with a distant view of your beautiful mountains, it would be ideal, provided it was not in an inaccessible location.

After the meeting, Mr. McCormick explained to a Tidings representative that the probable reason why hotel builders had not done anything for Ashland was because representatives of other cities had done more to persuade them to invest elsewhere. Personal work, rather than magazine advertising, he believed would prove the most efficacious method of interesting capitalists in the project.

Mr. McCormick questioned if there was any place which had as many attractions within a day's drive as Ashland. When shown a bottle of Pompadour Lithia water, he suggested that it would be much better to change the label so it would read "Ashland Lithia Water," instead of "Natural Lithia Water." He called attention to the great advertising value of the White Rock mineral water label, and suggested that

the Ashland label might have an attractive view of Lithia park.
