NAMELESS MARTYR BURIED WITH IMPRES-SIVE CEREMONIES TODAY

(Continued from Page 1) placed upon the bier the Victoria cross—a markedly impressive moment, for it was the first time in history that the Victoria cross has been bestowed upon any other than a subject of the king of England.

Marshal Foch stepped forward, saluted the dead and paced on the casket the croix de guerre. The unknown soldier had previously been decorated with the medaille militaire and the legion of honor emblem before the body was shipped from France.

General Diaz, Italian chief of staff, moved up, saluted the Unknown and rested on the coffin the Italian medal for valor. The Italian commander withdrew.

Lieutenant General Baron Jacques of the Belgian army then approached

the casket and placed upon it the Belgian croix de guerre.

Final Resting Place The casket was again lifted by the body-bearers and carried to the place prepared for it in the base of the sarcophagus, not far from the spot where rests the body of Admiral Dewey. The last procession was made through an armed guard. The line drew outside the amphitheatre and was followed by the honorary pall-bearers, President Harding, his cabinet, foreign diplomats, and, in orderly fashion, all the had witnesses the ceremonies in the amphitheatre.

After the casket had been placed at the entrance to the sarcophagus the ceremonies for the dead were conducted by the chaplains—first in the Episcopal faith, then in the Catholic faith, and then in the Hebrew. The body was then entombed.

Three salvos rang out from the firing battery. The din of the salute to the dead was hardly stilled when a bugler standing close by the spot where the Unknown had been laid to rest, sounded "Taps." From the heights above Arlington the batteries of Fort Myer thundered the national salute of twenty-one guns.

The great ceremony over, the mourners literally melted away, leaving the Unknown Soldier to "the lone couch of his everlasting sleep."
