Sergeant Ball Recalls Fight— Winfield Scott Ball, who served for four years in the Civil war, rising from the ranks to sergeant, had some very interesting and dangerous experiences during that war. At the siege of Vicksburg he and his comrades were under constant fire for forty-two days. In another battle, when a truce was declared to bury the dead, three times as many rebel soldiers were found on the Union battlefield as there were northern soldiers engaged in the struggle. Three times the latter were driven out of their shallow trenches, with the aid of a battery's enflaming fire of grape and canister, but each time the invader swore forced back at the point of the bayonet. Few bloodier battles are recorded in history. At one time Sergeant Ball disciplined

a score of recruits for insubordinations by marching them back and forth at double-quick until their tongues were hanging out and they were ready to obey orders. Father Ball, who is peacefully spending the evening of his life in Ashland, is of the opinion that the world war had nothing on the rebellion for bloodiness and hardships.
