Oregon Apples in London — Of interest to local orchardists and fruit men is the following in the Portland Oregonian: "In London Oregon apples will net about 50 cents a box more than had been anticipated, according to a cable from J. E. Pouport. This is the first shipment sent out from Portland by that firm, and the cablegram says that extra fancy Newtowns sold for \$4.32 a box, 'C' grade for \$3.78, and Spitzenburgs for \$3.64. These apples were shipped across the continent. About November 25 the steamer which left the municipal terminal for London with apples via the Panama canal will reach its destination and a cablegram is being awaited with considerable interest, so that growers may be able to know if this method of shipment is an improvement over
