Return From Calif.—Mrs. Hattie Abbott and son, Max Camps, have returned home from Yreka, Calif., where they have been visiting for the past six months.

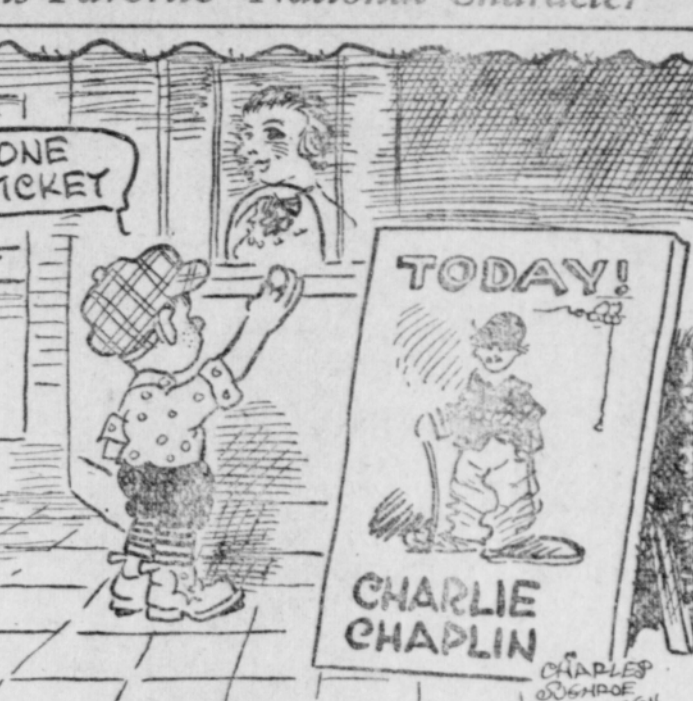

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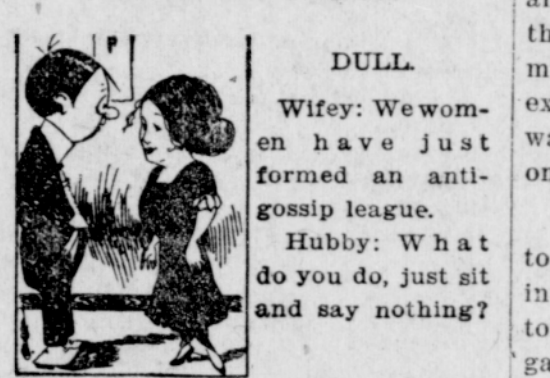
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Grocer Has the Grippe—E. W. Flackus, of the Square Deal grocery, has been quite ill for several days with the grippe at his home on Seventh street.

try to make some more money so as to keep people thinking well of me. When they would not subscribe for the little sheet I threw it on porches and in front yards, but my impression is that when they saw it they threw it aside.

After this failed, I started to write

and was actually ashamed of the fact that I had ever mentioned the matter to anybody. And this is what our distinguished thinker and writer, who was an accredited delegate at the Peace conference at Paris, is writing to me about. It seems so strange to me now to be reading all about the great peace conference in session at Washington, D. C., with the leading nations of the world represented by their ablest statesmen, discussing the same question about which I was many times called a fool and for which I was spending my own money and giving my own time, and for which I was many times roundly abused and often refused churches and buildings in which to speak.

The largest number I ever had to hear me was nine, and that was in a small school house in Washington state at a place called Washugall.

I then thought I could at least get into Methodist churches and before Methodist audiences, as I had been a Methodist all my life, not a very good one, to be sure, but a member just the same. So I went to Gresham, Ore., and asked for the privilege of speaking the following Sunday on Universal Peace.

At this point I became discouraged, went home and told my wife that if anything more was ever said or written upon that subject, someone else would do it. I destroyed all the papers left that I had printed, burned my manuscript and lectures
