C. Lake Hotel Asks \$120,000, Portland C. of C.

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 18.—A re-
quest that the Portland Chamber of
Commerce raise \$120,000 to finance
improvements of the Crater Lake
hotel, necessary for the coming sea-
son, was made yesterday by Eric
V. Hauser, president of the Crater
Lake National Park company.

"The financing of this project,"
ran Mr. Hauser's report to the cham-
ber, "should be undertaken immedi-
ately and carried to completion
within thirty days, if satisfactory
and progressive showing is to be
made next year."

Among the proposed improve-
ments asked for in the report would
be a sixty-room wing, costing \$60,-
000. An additional \$20,000 would
be spent for general repairs, and the
remainder of the sum expended in
taking up an option on the property
from A. L. Parkhurst, formerly the
owner. The report further showed
that approximately 5000 guests were
registered at the hotel this season,
and that the net earnings of the es-
tablishment were \$8095.

Ashland Lacks \$337 To Meet Red Cross Quota

With reports from Talent, Valley
