## Colored Scenic Photos Shown Christian Church

The Patterson pictures given at the Christian church Friday night, were exceedingly fine. The pictures were reproduced by magic lantern slides and were colored photographs of Oregon and California scenery and flowers. For centuries back artists have tried again and again to produce photographs expressing nature's colors with the camera without any other means of coloring, and at last this wonder has been accomplished. And the Ashland people are indeed fortunate to see, perhaps the first natural colored photographs that have been displayed in Southern Oregon.

We can scarcely realize that we have been permitted to see that for which generations back have lived and died hoping to see, yet never saw—the colored photograph.

Frank Patterson, scenic artist, of Medford, was the producer of the pictures displayed on Friday night, and to say that the audience of 200 people were pleased with the beautiful views expresses it mildly.

The song, "In Ashland," was sung by a quartet and illustrated on the screen by colored views of Ashland's beautiful park scenery.

Delbert Fehl, of Medford, is the author of the song and it has pleasing words and beautiful music, and was highly appreciated by the audience here.

## County Defers Road Changes Until January

The Jackson county court had planned on changing the boundary lines of a number of road districts at the September term, but found that the law had been changed in this regard, so that no boundary line can be changed until the January term.

Therefore in all road districts in which meetings have already been called to vote on the levy, the levy will be on the same boundaries as last year.

#### SLIGHT INCREASE IN ESPEE CAR LOADING

A slight improvement in freight car loading is shown by the Southern Pacific company's carloading reports for the month of October. During this month 85,953 cars were loaded on the Pacific system as compared with 82,215 cars in the same month in 1920. The Portland division is responsible for a larger part of this increase, owing to the increased lumber business in Oregon this year. The Salt Lake, Coast, Stockton and Los Angeles divisions also show increases.

Increased efficiency in carloading is also shown by the company's report. The average load per car in October, 1921, was 23.3 tons, as compared with 26.8 tons in October, 1920, an increase of 1:5 tons per

Miracles are good, but to relieve a brother, to draw a friend from the depths of misery, to pardon the virtues of an enemy, these are greater miracles.

**EVERYDAY GOOD THINGS**

A tender well-seasoned and cooked tongue is one of the most tasty of meats.

**Beef Tongue en Casserole.**—Choose a tongue which has been slightly corned, remove all the rough portions, rub with flour to which has been added a dash of ginger and allspice. Fry a few slices of salt pork, then add a sliced onion and the tongue, tying it into shape. Flour it lightly on all sides. Make a cupful of gravy, adding the juice of a lemon, three tablespoonsful of shredded almonds, and a half cupful of seeded raisins. Put the tongue in a round casserole, pour over the gravy and bake one-half hour in a moderate oven. Untie the tongue, turn out on a platter and serve with the gravy over it.

Rhubarb is delicious baked. Take a cupful of sugar to a pint of finely cut rhubarb. Bake in an earthen dish until jellylike in consistency.

Fruit juices which lack the thickening quality called pectin, may be supplied with it by using the white pith of an orange peel. Remove all the rind and cut it in strips, cover with cold water and simmer for an hour or two to remove all the pectin and boil up again. There will be sufficient pectin in half an orange rind to thicken several glasses of jelly.

**Iced Cocoa.**—Put two heaping teaspoonfuls of cocoa into a double boiler, add half of a pint of boiling water and cook five minutes; add one-half pint of milk, beat thoroughly and take from the fire. At serving time fill the glasses one-third full of chipped ice, add a teaspoonful of powdered sugar, fill the glass two-thirds full of cocoa and top with whipped cream.

**Oatmeal Cookies.**—Take two cupfuls of browned and ground oatmeal, two cupfuls of flour, one egg, one-half cupful of sour milk, one-half teaspoonful of soda, one-half cupful of shortening and a cupful of sugar; add raisins and nuts and drop from a teaspoon on a well-greased baking sheet. Bake in a moderate oven until firm to the touch.
