



SOLVES IDLE PROBLEM

Italian Government Puts Unemployed Men to Work.

Development of Natural Resources of the Country Under Comprehensive Plan Gives Work to Many Hundreds of Idle.

Rome.—The Italian government is meeting its problem of unemployment by setting the idle men to work to develop to the utmost the natural resources of the country.

The sum of 700,000,000 lire, equivalent to about \$28,000,000, has been another 100,000,000 lire (\$4,000,000), has been assigned to land reclamation. Funds for these enterprises are obtained from banks.

Another 150,000,000 lire, about \$6, 000,000, will be spent on improving the telegraph and telephone systems, and in addition, the government has authorized the laying of a submarine cable so as to obtain direct communication with Spain, Greece, Brazil, Uruguay and Argentina, thus rendering Italy independent of foreign cable

The development of Italy's waterthe war she obtained about 935,000 horsepower from that source. Since then the total horse-power has been increased to 1,750,000. To make this possible, fifty-nine reservoirs and artificial lakes have been constructed.

Another important industrial project is the reclamation of the Pontine marshes, which cover about 150,000 acres between Rome and Naples. This land heretofore has been submerged for five months each year by torrents which poured down from the neighboring mountains and, stagnating on the land, converted that area into a dangerous fever trap.
