TAX LEVY FOR LAKE O'WOODS ROAD DEFEATED

The proposed two-mill tax levy for the improvement of the road to Lake o' Woods was defeated by a vote of 66 to 40 yesterday at an election held at Bellevue school house. The probable reason for the defeat of the proposed measure is explained by Lake o' Woods summer residents who took an active interest in the election, as due to the fact that the district includes the people who live along the Pacific highway south of Ashland, and adjacent to the Green Springs mountain road to Klamath Falls, these residents not being directly interested in the proposed improvement.

Louis Dodge was present at the election and informed the voters that Ashland citizens were willing to make a substantial contribution to the fund improving the Dead Indian road. In one hour's time Mr. Dodge had secured subscriptions to this fund amounting to \$200, and it was believed that this sum might have been increased to \$1000. J. J. Murphy and Irving Vining offered substantial assistance. Henry Moore, who lives on the road to Lake o' Woods, announced that eight or ten of his neighbors had each agreed to donate thirty days' work on the road, providing satisfactory outside help was obtained.

Judge George Gardner attended the election and answered a number of questions regarding the project, stating that the county would duplicate whatever the people of the district gave for the improvement of the road in question.

Owing to the decisive defeat of the tax levy, it seems likely that no further effort will be made to improve the road by this means, but to rely upon private subscriptions and county aid. The forestry service has already improved the road beyond Lake o' Woods.

To Distribute Vegetable Seeds

Vegetable seeds are now ready for distribution by the government, according to a recently received statement from Senator Robert N. Stanfield. Senator Stanfield states that he has been allotted a quantity of vegetable seed, five kinds to the package, and a few flower seeds. He asks that requests for the seeds be made by December 1, the seeds to be mailed shortly after January 1. According to Senator Stanfield, the distribution costs the government \$360,000. The value of the products grown from the seeds is estimated at \$140,000,000.

Urges Fruit Label

H. H. Hosler thinks that Ashland fruit growers are missing an excellent opportunity to advertise this locality and also to make future sales of their products by not affixing an attractive label to all boxes of fruit shipped out of town. Another Granite City booster suggests that all local growers might use the same style of label, affixing their own name thereon with a rubber stamp. In the matter of advertising our products, it is thought that we might learn much from California.

Tourists Blocked

Mrs. W. F. Beach, of Newark, N. J., stopped at Hotel Ashland yesterday, en route to California, having been marooned in one of the trains which were snow-bound in the Columbia river gorge during the recent storm. Mrs. Beach said it was an interesting experience, and that the train passengers were given a wonderful view of snow and ice, but suffered no inconvenience.

Barn Burned

An old barn which stood on the east side of the highway about two miles south of Talent burned last night. Cause of the fire is not known. The barn was built by D. Perozzi in 1907 and was later owned by Dr. Page, of Medford, but the present ownership has not been ascertained. The barn contained a tractor, three tons of hay and a threshing machine, owned by Grant Davis and son. The latter was insured in a company represented by the Billings agency.

Boosts Home Building

Miss Mildred Munson, of Denver, registered at Hotel Ashland yesterday and is trying to interest Ashlanders in house building.

Authority to open the recently constructed bridge over Deer creek at Selma for traffic was received by Judge Eclus Pollock Wednesday morning. The detour bridge was threatened by high water, and as the new bridge was considered ready by local engineers, a message was sent to State Engineer Herbert Nunn of the state highway commission, who granted the request to open the bridge at this time.—Grants Pass Courier.

Council Fixes Budget

At a special meeting last evening the city council formally ratified the budget for the ensuing year, substantially as recommended at a recent meeting. No protests were made at this meeting. On account of the defeat of the proposed bond issue, a saving in interest, which would have been paid on said bonds, will be effected. The levy was cut down to 19.3 mills. It was 20.9 last year.
