The White House is so named because it is built of white freestone.

The site was selected by President Washington and Maj. Peter Charles L'Enfant, planner of the capital city,

The architect was James Hoban of Dublin. The plans were chosen by competition.

The cornerstone was laid October

The first occupant was President and Mrs. Adams, in November, 1800.

The White House was burned by the

British in 1814. It was first heated by gas in 1848.

A system of heating and ventilation was installed in 1853.

The original cost of the White House was met out of the proceeds from the sale of lands donated by Maryland and Virginia.




