### Large Shipment Of Apples Made From Portland

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 30.—The largest shipment of apples by direct water route this year is leaving Portland this week en route to England on the steamship Nebraska. Between fifteen and twenty thousand boxes of apples assembled from The Dalles and points in the Willamette and Umpqua valleys will be included in the shipment.

England is offering one of the best markets for apples this season, and due to the wide distribution they are receiving in that country. Oregon apples are gaining a great deal of advertising which will be favorable toward trade for another year.

The Nebraska will carry 80,000 boxes of apples, an amount that would make a whole train load of more than 100 cars. This is one of
