school children of Ashland. If the weather is very rainy the children will not be present. The city and school bands together will play the Marseillaise, and the French and American flags will be displayed together.

Donald Spencer, as adjutant of the American Legion, will have charge of the ceremonies. Prof. Irving Vining will deliver a brief address of welcome on behalf of the city and the Legion, after which Hanford McNider, national commander of the American Legion, will be called upon for a speech, followed by Marshall Foch. The latter does not speak English, but his remarks will be translated into our language as spoken.

Glenn Simpson, commander, and Don Spencer, adjutant, respectively, of the local post of the American Legion, will meet the special train at Grants Pass and accompany it to Ashland. Marshal Foch is spending today in Portland, where he was welcomed by Governor Olcott and Mayor Baker, and escorted from his train by a battalion of infantry from the Vancouver barracks, and the Fifty-fifth regimental band. A motor trip on the Columbia River highway, a banquet at 6:30 o'clock and

a mass meeting in the evening complete the program.

Through the courtesy of the American Legion, Marshal Foch will be presented with two cases of Ashland lithia water bottled by the Pompadour Mineral Springs company. Adjutant Spencer states that this water so nearly resembles the famous Vichy water of France, which he has drunk as it came from the ground, as to be scarcely distinguishable.

## Another Royal Suggestion Chocolate Layer and Maple Nut Cake

From the NEW ROYAL COOK BOOK

THERE are thirty-two unusual cake recipes in the chapter on cakes in the New Royal Cook Book! Here are two of them:

#### Chocolate Layer Cake

1/2 cup shortening  
1 cup sugar  
1 egg  
1 cup milk  
1 1/2 cups flour  
4 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Cream shortening; add sugar gradually, beating well; add beaten eggs, one-half the milk and mix well; add one-half the flour which has been sifted with salt and baking powder; add remainder of milk, then remainder of flour and flavoring; beat after each addition. Bake in greased layer cake tins in moderate oven 15 to 20 minutes. Put together with

#### Chocolate Filling and Icing

3 cups confectioner's sugar  
boiling water  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
2 ounces unsweetened chocolate (2 squares)  
1/2 teaspoon grated orange peel  
To sugar add boiling water very slowly to make a smooth paste; add vanilla, melted chocolate and orange peel. Spread between layers and on top of cake.

#### Maple Nut Cake

1/2 cup shortening  
1 cup light brown sugar

2 eggs  
1/2 cup milk  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons Royal Baking Powder  
1 cup chopped nuts—preferably pecans  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Cream shortening, add sugar slowly and yolks of eggs and milk and beat well; sift flour, salt and baking powder together and add chopped nuts; fold in beaten whites of eggs; add flavoring. Bake in well greased loaf pan in moderate oven 35 to 45 minutes. Cover top with maple icing and sprinkle with chopped nuts while still soft.

#### Maple Icing

1/2 teaspoon butter  
1 tablespoon hot milk  
1 1/2 cups confectioner's sugar  
1/2 teaspoon maple flavoring  
Add butter to hot milk; add sugar slowly to make paste of the right consistency to spread; add flavoring and spread on top and sides of cake.
