

JURY IS SELECTED FOR KUBLI CASE; JOHNSON CALLED

JACKSONVILLE, Or., Dec. 3.—The selection of a jury to hear the trial of Chester Kubli, Applegate cattleman, who is charged with aiding W. H. Johnson, former cashier of the Bank of Jacksonville to injure and defraud that bank, consumed all of the time in court Wednesday and took until about 10 o'clock Thursday morning. The jury list is as follows: A. A. Schuchard, W. B. Bidle, W. H. Gore, W. A. Moffit, Welborn Beeson, E. B. Shaw, L. Colver, George B. Dean, J. C. Herring, Jas. B. Stewart, J. H. French, and G. H. Yeo.

W. H. Johnson, former cashier of the Bank of Jacksonville, who is

staying at his mother's home while in Jacksonville, took the stand as the first witness for the prosecution and testified at length under both direct and cross examination. His testimony for the most part was technical, dealing with the ledger sheets of the bank. He testified under cross examination that Kubli had no knowledge of the handling of the affairs of the bank, nor of the financial weakness of the bank, and that at all times it had appeared that Kubli had intentions of making up any overdrafts.

E. E. Kahler, the accountant who handled the affairs of the bank after the failure of that institution, then took the stand for the state and testified that according to the books, Kubli's overdrafts had amounted to a sum in the neighborhood of \$42,000.

At the completion of Kahler's testimony, Kubli testified that he deposited and drew on the bank without any knowledge of the condition of his account, relying solely on W. H. Johnson to take care of the finances. That he deposited checks, drafts and cash without receiving

receipts for them, and that he had absolutely no knowledge of any plot to defraud the bank.
